interned at the Cedar County (Nebraska) Extension Office,

assisting with its 4-H program. "I really liked it and realized how much I had missed 4-H," Smolek said. "That was the point for me where I knew this was what I really want to do.

Wanting to stay in the area but with no local 4-H positions available, Smolek accepted a position with Northeast Ne*braska News* as an ag reporter and editor of the Randolph Times.

However, when Fosheim resigned, the Yankton position became available, and Smolek saw a chance to land her dream job. She applied for the position and was chosen as Fosheim's replacement.

"I was so excited," she said. "I was counting down the days until I could start.

As 4-H/youth development coordinator, Smolek will direct and assist with all 4-H programs and events in Yankton County. She will also be involved with the county's youth education programs that tie in agriculture with various STEM (science, technology, engineering and mathematics) areas.

"4-H is a lot more than just animals and farms," Smolek said. "There are so many things you can do. If a person has any kind of interest, it fits somewhere in 4-H."

Since she is new to the position. Smolek said she will heavily utilize notes left behind by Fosheim, as well as the skills she learned from extension educator Jackie Steffen at the Cedar County office.

'Jackie has experience as an elementary teacher, so I took a lot from her," Smolek said. "I learned a ton about organizing programs and interacting with the kids.'

The new coordinator also plans to implement many ideas of her own and hopes to get more involved with the different youth organizations in the community. Currently she is working on an animal science camp, a babysitting clinic and a nutrition program.

Most of all, Smolek said she wants to stay as flexible as possible for the time being.

"I want to find out what the county wants and needs for youth development programming, and then help fill that need for them," she said.

Iowa, Connecticut and Minnesota. The sixth couple was denied a marriage license Thursday, Newville said.

Nancy Rosenbrahn, of Rapid City, married her longtime partner in April in Minneapolis and said it doesn't matter which state is first or

"I think what matters is that we're all sending a message to either the Supreme Court or the legislators in Washington, D.C., that this has got to stop," she said Wednesday.

The lawsuit, filed by Minneapolis attorney Josh Newville, claims three violations that are guaranteed in the 14th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution: deprivation of equal protection, due

process and right to travel. "The State will incur little to no burden in allowing same-sex couples to marry and in recognizing the lawful marriages of same-sex couples from other jurisdictions on the same terms as different-sex couples, while the hardship to Plaintiffs of being denied due process, equal protection, and privileges or mmunities is severe, subjecting them to an irreparable denial of their constitutional rights," it states.

The complaint seeks a declaration that the statute and constitutional bans are unconstitutional and asks that the defendants be prevented from enforcing the bans and be required to issue marriage licenses to same-sex couples and recognize gay marriages from other states. It also seeks reimbursement for lawyers and other costs.

North Dakota voters in 2004 overwhelmingly passed a constitutional ban on samesex marriage.

Newville said several couples from North Dakota have contacted him about possibly representing them for a legal challenge in that state, which he's seriously considering.

On Wednesday, Thompson, North Dakota, Mayor Karyn Hippen became the first in the state to join a national coalition of mayors who support same-sex marriage. Although 73 percent of the voters favored the constitutional ban, Hippen said she believes there's support in the state for the issue.




