Seniors Shine For YHS In Finale

Seniors accounted for four of Yankton's five victories as Yankton finished the regular season at its home last-chance meet on Thursday at Williams Field.

On the girls' side, senior Annie Kruse broke the five-minute mark in the 1600, clocking a 4:59.5 to win that event. The clocking ranks in the top-10 all-time in the state of South Dakota.

Also in that 1600, Savannah Woods (5:16.8) finished second.

Also for the Gazelles, senior Hailey Luken won the 100-meter hurdles in 15.0 seconds. She also placed second in the 100 (12.8).

On the boys' side, senior J.J. Hejna won one event and tied for first in another. He won the triple jump at 42-9 1/4, and tied Roosevelt's David Mulbah in the high jump at 6-7. Junior Brady Hale gave Yankton a 1-2 finish in the triple jump, posting a mark of 41-10.

The lone underclassman to win for Yankton was Charlie Stephenson, who claimed the 110-meter hurdles (15.8). He also finished second in the 300 hurdles (41.3).

The meet included the four Sioux Falls schools, Brandon Valley and Harrisburg.

Several Yankton athletes will compete in the South Dakota State Class AA Track and Field Meet, May 30-31 in Sioux Falls. The May 30 events will be held on the Sioux Falls O'Gorman campus.

Nebraska State Meet Begins Today

OMAHA, Neb. — A total of 12 area teams, six each in Class C and D, will hope their regular season and district performances are enough to set them up for strong finishes at the Nebraska State Track Meet.

The 2-day meet begins today (Friday) and concludes Saturday at Omaha's Burke Stadium.

Class D competition begins at 9 a.m. today, with Class C competition beginning at 3:30 p.m. Action in all classes will begin at 9:30 a.m. on Saturday.

Here is a look at area teams competing. Teams are listed by class and in alphabetical order.

Class C

Creighton The Bulldogs qualified three girls and three boys athletes, including one each in the pole vault. Senior, Jake Ripp qualified in a six-way

feet-6. His girls' teammate Emily Boyle, a fellow senior, qualified for the vault at 8-4. On the girls' side, junior Rebecca Eggerling will compete in the triple jump (33-2.5) and junior Emily Sorensen will run in the 400-meter dash (1:02.7).

400-meter dash (1:02.7). Also for the boys, senior Jacob Morrill will close his career by running in the 100 (11.6), while sophomore Brook Baller qualified in the 200 (23.6).

Crofton

The Warriors and Lady Warriors will have a combined 10 athletes at the state meet, and the girls are especially primed for a strong team finish, according to head coach Rod Hegge.

Crofton's girls finished third in Class C a year ago, and based on returning points, they could again be in the running for a high finish.

"We scored 60 last year and we ended up third, so it just depends," Hegge said. "The district, that's a tough gauge to go by. There are always an influx of freshman and you don't know how they'll react."

Crofton also has a pair of standout freshmen who qualified for state. Monica Arens will compete in the discus (114-3), while Kelsey Sanger will compete in the 800 (2:28.5) and both relays.

Junior Allison Arens qualified in the to 1600-meter run (6:05.9) and 3200 (13:12.2), while junior Quinn Wragge will

run in the 400 (1:02.3) and 800 (2:26.5). In the throws, junior Maria Wortmann is ranked fourth in the discus (127-3) and fifth in the shot put (41-2.5).

The 1600 relay quartet of Wragge, Sanger, Allison Arens and Wortmann come in ranked fourth, while the 3200 relay group of Sanger, Monica Arens, senior Alex Allen and Wragge have the potential for something special, their coach said.

"I really look forward to seeing what that group can do," Hegge said. "Their actual district time wasn't the greatest, but the weather wasn't conducive to a great time. We've run a 10:05 before, so hopefully we can get off on the right track."

On the boys' side, the Warriors will have four athletes in Omaha, with three of them competing in two events.

Senior Alex Janssen qualified in the 1600 (4:45.4) and 3200 (10:10.1), while senior Eric Kleinschmit qualified in the 110 hurdles (16.4) and triple jump (40-7), and senior Evan Woockman will compete in the 300 hurdles (42.9) and pole vault (12-0).

All three were at state a year ago, and will be joined this weekend by junior Tyler Koch who qualified in the shot put (41-11). "They understand the arron as it's pice

"They understand the arena, so it's nice to have a crew like that," Hegge said. "Sometimes you have to back them off a little bit, because you don't want them to get worn out before driving down there. They're pretty excited."

Junior sprinter Alli Walter has a solid chance to not only medal in both of her events, but could leave Omaha with two top-3 finishes for the Trojans. Walter has the second-best time in the

Walter has the second-best time in the 100-meter dash (12.3) and is seeded fifth in the 200 (26.0) — six-tenths of a second behind first.

"She went down there last year and scored some points for us, so it was her experience that will really help her out the most," Cedar Catholic coach Chad Cattau said. "Not only for herself; she can be that calming presence, but most of the other kids are new to going down there.

"We're looking for her to do some good things."

Walter's teammate on the girls' side, sophomore Carly Becker, will compete in the long jump (15-6.25) and triple jump (32-10.5).

The Cedar Catholic boys will have six athletes in Omaha, including one relay.

Junior James Kaiser will compete in the long jump (21-0), while junior Andrew Schieffer qualified in the triple jump (40-2.5) and junior Jared Wiebelhaus will run in the 110 hurdles (17.0).

The Trojans also qualified their 3200 relay, with the quartet of junior Luke Burbach, Kaiser, sophomore Noah Noecker

Not exactly the place, given the high-level competition, where you expect to get things straightened out. But the Flyers did exactly that.
