"Calling us a tribute band is like saying Mount Rushmore is a roadside attraction," he told the Press & Dakotan in a phone interview.

'We are so much more than a cover band. Don't confuse us with the tons of tribute acts. We are so much more," he said. "We are more like Trans-Siberian Orchestra and the Blue Man Group. You could say, we're similar to Blue Man Group and Van Halen getting into a wreck."

Happy pointed to the band's extensive use of make-up, costumes, lights, sound, video, smoke, fire and pyrotechnics — not to mention hordes of screaming fans.

'We blow off a couple thousand dollars of pyro (at a concert). And we have the wardrobe that, when it comes together, has almost got its own ZIP code," he said. "We have spent more money on wigs and costumes than most bands. We have developed it over the years and constantly tweak it."

Hairball's name reflects its origins, but the band has evolved through the years.

Creator and manager Mike Findling (aka Chainsaw Caine) started the band in 2000 as a spoof on the hair metal decade of the '80s. The tongue-in-cheek name was representative of the good-natured "laugh



Organizers also raise money for a scholarship fund for a graduate from Irene-Wakonda High School. Funds may also support the Pleasant Valley Lutheran Church, WELCA, Sunday School, and the Cemetery Fund.
