VERMILLION - Elizabeth (Betty) Smith, Ph.D., associate professor of political science at the University of South Dakota, is the 2014 recipient of the Blair and Linda Tremere Faculty Service Award, which is presented annually to a member of the College of Arts & Sciences faculty who has demonstrated outstanding public service to the local community or to the state of South Dakota.

Smith, the associate director of the Farber Center for Civic Leadership at the University of South Dakota, was recognized for her outstanding public service, most notably with the Vermillion Chamber Development Company and raising money and awareness for Parkinson's disease research. She teaches courses on American Politics, Public Administration and the death penalty. In addition to her teaching responsibilities, Šmith serves as chair of the Committee on Civic Education and Engagement for the American Political Science Association. A member of the USD faculty since 1998, Smith was the 2004 recipient of the South Dakota "Professor of the Year" Award by the Council for Advancement




