'The King And I' Holds Court In Dakota Theatre

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While "The King and I" is widely regarded as a classic of musical theater, the production can be a difficult one to find.

However, Yankton's Lewis & Clark Theatre Company is offering area theatregoers a chance to see the performance as it kicks off its new season next week at the Dakota Theatre.

It's a show that just doesn't come around a lot," said director Andy Henricktrigued by it, because it's a rare production and it's a show that's a little bit unique and unlike what people are used to seeing.'

"It's the story of how she shows up in this totally new world, and it's unlike anything she's ever seen before with how much power the King has and the treatment of women," Henrickson said. "She doesn't quite see things the same way. So the story is about how the King and Anna learn from one another and appreciate one another."

The musical is seen as a unique love story, he said, and features an unpredictable conclusion.

would come as a shock," Henrickson said.

The director added that, for many, the plot may seem similar to "The Sound of

Music. "They're both stories of how a group of children come to love a woman," he said. "In 'The Sound of Music,' it's Maria, and in

'The King and I,' it's Anna." The King and I" also features a "show within a show," Henrickson said, as the production features a ballet performance that lasts about 15 to 20 minutes.

"Again, we're not used to that," he said. "'Oklahoma!' does have a ballet production, but it's nothing like

the story, audience members will be impressed before the show even begins, Henrickson said. Both the set and costumes are extremely colorful and very different from those of Western musicals, he said.

"When the curtain opens, there's definitely going to be that moment of 'Oh my, we've never seen anything like this before," he said.
"It's very grand."

"The King and I" will be performed at 7:30 p.m. June 5-6 and at 2 p.m. June 7-8. The following week, performances will be held at 7:30 p.m. June 12-14 and at 2 p.m. June 15. Tickets for Thurstween 9 a.m. and 3 p.m., Monday-Friday, or call 605-665-47Ĭ1.
