Set For The Polls Senate Races To Take Center Stage On Tuesday

The top of the ballot carries high-profile races, but few area contests appear in Tuesday's primary election in South Dakota

That seems to be trending into a light voter turnout, if early balloting is any indication.

Yankton County Auditor Patty Hojem

noted the number of early ballots finally broke out of double digits.

"We finally hit 100, out of 13,203 voters," she said late Thursday afternoon. "It's picked up the last few days. Right now, we have 138 (early ballots).

Among Yankton County voters, Republicans will choose U.S. Senate, governor and District 18 Senate candidates. Democrats will choose a governor candidate.

Around the rest of southeast South

Dakota, voters will decide county races as well as the U.S. Senate and gubernatorial races. GOP primary races will be held for county seats in Bon Homme, Hutchinson and Union counties. Democratic primaries will be held in Charles Mix and Clay counties.

School Threat Yankton Man Enters A Plea Of **Not Guilty**

A Yankton man pleaded not guilty Friday to two counts of making terroristic threats on Twitter.

Travis Potts, 23, was arrested May 7 after authorities received a report of statements he had posted on the social media site.

On April 17, Potts tweeted: "Current mood: I feel like shooting up a middle school then setting it on fire.

On April 29, he tweeted: "What a s*** day. I just want to set a toddler on fire. The Yankton Police Department was notified of the tweets May 7 and subsequently ar-

Making terroristic threats is a class 5 felony punishable by up to five years in the state penitentiary and/or a \$10,000 fine.

A tentative jury trial date was set for 9 a.m. July 29. If a plea agreement is to be reached, Circuit Judge Glen Eng set the deadline for July 11.

Reconstruction Of Douglas Avenue Begins Monday

Work is expected to get under way next week on the reconstruction of Douglas Avenue between Fourth and Second streets, according to Yankton's director of public services.

If the weather cooperates, Feimer Construction will proceed with the project on Monday, Kevin Kuhl said.

"It is a downtown street that has been in need of repair for a number of years," he stated. "There will be some storm sewer added to improve the drainage on that north block. The curb and gutter will be

new, along with about a six-foot stretch of sidewalk behind the curb.'

Traffic control signage will be posted to aid the traveling public in reaching their destination. East and westbound traffic will be maintained at the Third Street intersection for the duration of the project.

"What is unique about this street is its extra width," Kuhl said. "We're going to be doing the west half of the street to begin with, but the east half will have one-way traffic, along with some parking.'

Work on the west side of Douglas Avenue will hopefully
