Yankton finished 12th in the boys' 3200 relay, as senior Justin Grode, junior Connor Chambers and sophomores Gabe Dannenbring and Jared Rafferty finished in 8:39.09.

Yankton qualified one relay for finals today (Saturday), the 1600 relay. The foursome of Olson, Rose, Mason Strahl and Blake Savey clocked a 3:32.40. Hejna will likely conclude his YHS career by subbing in for one of the legs of that relay.
