Yankton's Stewart Takes Aim At School Record fifth in the long jump at

SIOUX FALLS — Emma Stewart wants to pass her cousin on the Yankton High School track record books.

The sophomore pulls no punches: She wants to eclipse the school's record mark of 18 feet, 2 inches in the long jump.

Though Stewart didn't improve on her season best (17-7.5) Saturday at the Howard Wood Dakota Relays in Sioux Falls, she said she feels like she's nearing Heather's Olson record mark.

"She always asks me what I got after each meet," Stewart said. "I want her record. I want those bragging rights."

Stewart, who finished fifth Saturday at 17-5.5, maintains that it helps that her jumps coach is Justin Olson — who happens to be married to Heather.

"It helps that we're related," Stewart said, smiling. "He can tell me like it is, and I can take it."

Although Stewart finished

Howard Wood, she was actually third among Class AA athletes. The annual meet combines entrants from all classes — as well as athletes from North Dakota and Min-Watertown's Macy Denzer won the long jump title at 18-5.5, and was followed by an Alberta. Canada athlete

(17-10), Rapid City Steven's Elizabeth Schaefer (17-6.25) and Dakota Valley's Sara Bohan (17-5.5). "Yeah, it was weird, but that's what this weet does," Stewart said. "I'm definitely happy I got fifth."

Stewart wasn't alone in cracking the top-5 for Yank-

ton in a jumping event. Lee Rose was third in the

boys' long jump (21-8.75), while Ethan-Parkston's Wes Dvorak finished fifth (21-3.75). Dvorak later finished second in both the 110 hur-dles (14.76) and 300 hurdles

(39.28). Also for Yankton, the Bucks 800 relay team finished fourth (1:30.94, second among Class AA schools) and their 400 relay quartet finished fifth (44.22, third

among AA). There were two other area champions on Saturday, both on the girls' side.

Payton Johanneson was Andes Central-Dakota Christian won the high jump (5-2), while Dakota Valley won the 1600-meter relay (4:06.84).

Irene-Wakonda's Lauren Sokolowski was fifth in the 100-meter hurdles (15.12), followed by Yankton's Madason Tessier (15.36). Bon Homme's Morgan Rothschadl was fourth in the 300 hurdles (46.41).

On the boys' side, Be-resford's Joseph Kirkebak was second in the high jump

USD Men's **Golf Team Wins** Summit League Championship South Dakota Wins Sum-

mit Golf Championship

LOMPOC, Calif. — South Dakota's men's golf team erased an 11-stroke deficit and passed two teams Sunday at La Parisima Golf Course to win the program's first Summit League Championship. The Coyotes advance to compete at one of six NCAA regional sites. Official championship selections will be announced at 9 a.m. Monday on the Golf Channel's Morning Drive.

The Coyotes got subpar rounds from senior Sam Matthew and sophomore Cody Seal in posting the round of the tournament, a 4-over-par 292 for a three-round total of 909 (+45). Oral Roberts fin-ished at 912 for second place and South Dakota State was third at 924. Both teams shot 18-over-par Sunday.

"What a surreal feeling to raise that trophy," said South Dakota head coach Nick Hovden. "Our team was so mentally tough today when it counted. I couldn't be more proud of this group. They worked their butts off.

"Our goal through two days was to get into the final

USD's Slam Sisters Coyotes Set Summit League Home Run Mark; Minogue Sets Single-Season Hits Record

VERMILLION - The beat goes on for the University of South Dakota softball team. And if the Coyotes have

their way, it'll continue up in Fargo, North Dakota. Čapping off a perfect

home season, the Coyotes finished off a sweep Sunday over rival South Dakota State with a 12-4 five-inning Summit League victory in Vermillion.

Not only did the Coyotes (26-23-1, 13-4) out-score the Jackrabbits 33-9 in the weekend series, they enter this week's Summit League tournament as perhaps the hottest team – outside of top-seeded North Dakota State.

"Everyone in our dugout is seeing the ball well and making the plays we need to make," senior shortstop Matley Jones said. "We've got a lot of high hopes for this week.'

Having secured the tournament's No. 2 seed - and first-round bye - with Saturday's sweep of the Jacks, the only thing left for the Coyotes to grab on Sunday was extra momentum. The Jackrabbits (22-27, 7-11), though, made life interesting, cutting a 5-0 deficit down to 5-4 in the top of the third inning. As has been the case since the Coyotes began their conference season, there was no panic. They went on to the score the next seven runs, ending the game in the fifth via the mercy rule. "I liked the adversity (Sunday), so we could see that we can get through it," head coach Amy Klyse said. "For us to be like, 'We're fine, stay chill, we can respond,' that's huge for us.'

Sure, the Coyotes wouldn't have been hurt by a loss Sunday, but there were

secondary goals to keep in mind, players said later. Chief among those was recording yet another sweep of SDSU and maintaining their win streak over their in-state rivals – USD has now won 12 straight games against the Jacks

There were other things to shoot for Sunday, as well, for the Coyotes.

Junior Yvon Minogue went 3-for-3 to break the Summit League single-season record for hits (she now has 87), which was set 20 years ago. And junior Katie Čochran hit a solo home run in the third to break the conference record for team homers in a season; USD now has 69 in 50 games.

"Individual records are awesome and exciting, and like we told the girls, it's everyone else giving her (Minogue) so many more atbats," Klyse said. "The team record is a bigger deal for us.

The victory over the Jacks ensured a perfect 10-0 home record this season for the Covotes, who hit .473 with 26 home runs and out-scored opponents 104-28 in Vermillion. Minogue, in particular, was most potent at the plate in home games, batting .647.

'We sign balls after every game she sets a record, so she's probably got a bucket full right now," joked senior Matley Jones.

"That team record is what we're most proud of, we put a lot of work into that."
