TYNDALL — The upcoming Bon Homme school board election has been delayed a week to meet legal requirements for election notices.

The election, originally scheduled for May 12, will now be held May 19, according to Bon Homme school business manager Gary Kortan.

"(The) election was moved to May 19 from May 12 so we met the election notice requirements of advertising the election at least 10 days prior to the election date," Kortan told the *Press & Dakotan* in an email response.

"No other adjustments (are needed) besides moving the date back one week," he said.

At the election, voters will decide two one-year seats. They will choose two candidates from among Norm Jelsma, Cheryl Ludens,

Preston Crissey and Teresa Sternhagen. The winners will serve July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2016.

Jelsma and Ludens are the incumbents in the race.

Two other races won't require an election, Kortan said.

• Three-year petitions were filed from Dr. Scott Weber, Amanda Larson and Ben Hellmann to fill the three open positions beginning on July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2018. Weber and Larson are the incumbents.

 Two-year petitions were filed from incumbents Michael Sedlacek and Ashley Armstrong to fill the two open positions beginning on July 1, 2015, through June 30, 2017.

Dorothy Hajek is the only current board member who did not seek re-election, Kortan said.

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through this wet season whatever it may bring. That's our hope. Basically, it looks like things are well in order for summer.'

Responding to a question from Commission chairman Todd Woods, Johnson said there could've been consequences for the bridge had

they not gone forward. 'The main concern with having the flow line lower than the bent cap tops is that the bridge is not designed for that situation; it's designed to support the loads that are above, with support around that piling," he said. "Once that support is gone, you have an unsupported piling underneath the bridge bents, and that is a concern. It could potentially lead to washout or failure of a bent.

Johnson said the survey also sought information on whether this additional riprap caused river levels upstream to change.

'The data shows through the (riprap) placement — at the Johnson Bridge, the water level didn't really rise," he said. "There was not a significant rise, if any, that came about as a result of the riprap placement."

Johnson said while stream stability seems to have been achieved for the time being, another concern about the

bridge is coming from one of its banks.

There are concerns at the southeast corner," he said. The issue there is that that bank is migrating towards the bridge and that east abutment. That's a real concern because if that bank gets to that abutment, it will wreak havoc with that abutment.'

Woods said he was happy overall with the report.

"I really like the fact that the level of the water wasn't affected by when we put riprap in that hole," he said. "We all know that bridge is an artery to the east side of our county, and if that bridge would go out or have to be closed, it'd make a lot of inconvenience to the rest of our citizens.'

He added that ultimately, they'll still need to look at replacement options for the

"I think that riprap placement was more of a Band-Aid for the time being," he said. "There will be a time that bridge will need to be replaced.

My love of cities is definitely rooted in my educational background, and so I see so much potential for Yankton in that regard. What you decide to build can help bring communities together, or it

can have a negative impact. How we choose to design can have a huge impact on how our community functions and how we feel about living in the community. I would love to see designing at a more human scale, rather than automobile scale."Mannes Homstad said Yankton would have to start with the basics such as having pedestrian crosswalks in places where the city wants people to go.

"I'd love for more people to embrace the idea of becoming more bike friendly," she said, "It is not just good for the people that choose to bike — because not everybody will choose to bike — but it is good for the community in other ways because of all the things it does to connect people to places. It really

promotes the idea of shopping locally because you are developing at a more compact scale.

Mannes Homstad said she'd like to see "Bikes For Teachers" in every Yankton school, but so far the program is just being tested at Webster.

"It depends how the bikes get used," she said. "It also depends on the level of support from the community and the ability to find sponsors. For less than \$5,000, we could put bikes in every school in town.
