USD Nursing's Historic Graduation Today

VERMILLION — The University of South Dakota's four-year Bachelor of Science degree in Nursing (BSN) graduates its first class of students since the four-year BSN program was re-instituted in 2013 by the SD Board of Regents. Fifty-five four-year BSN nursing students will receive their nursing pin on Friday, May 8 at USD nursing campuses in Vermillion and Sioux Falls. Graduation ceremonies are in Vermillion on Saturday, May 9 at the DakotaDome. USD Nursing in Vermillion and Sioux Falls started BSN programming in fall 2013. USD nursing students in Rapid City were admitted to the four-year BSN program starting in 2014, and Pierre students can begin the program in fall, 2016. USD Nursing offers other professional options, including an online post licensure RN – BSN program. This program offers existing registered nurses the chance to earn their undergraduate degree in nursing. Fifty-five students will receive this degree on May 8. In Vermillion, USD Nursing graduates will receive their nursing pin at a pinning ceremony on Friday, May 8, starting at 7 p.m. at Aalfs Auditorium on the USD campus.

Bon Homme Burn Ban Lifted

TYNDALL — Bon Homme County has lifted its burn ban, effective immediately. Bon Homme County emergency manager Scott Burgi told the *Press & Dakotan* that the decision was made Thursday after dry conditions improved around the county. Wednesday's precipitation eased conditions enough to lift the ban, Burgi said. "The rainfall was pretty spotty," he said. "I received reports ranging from 1.75 inches (of precipitation) two miles west of Scotland to 1.25 inches at Springfield and everything in between." The forecast calls for continued rainfall, possibly totaling significant amounts, through the weekend. The burn ban may be lifted, but Burgi said residents still need to take precautions and observe other laws on the books when it comes to burning. The Bon Homme County Commission has passed an ordinance requiring those under taking any type of large controlled burn must first contact the sheriff's office, Burgi said. "Someone with a burn pit or garbage barrel doesn't need to call," he said. "But if you're doing any type of big fire, like CRP (acreage), you still need to call and let the dispatch (at the courthouse) know so that we don't send out fire departments." Yankton Area Mental Wellness, Inc. (YAMWI), in cooperation with Southeast Job Link (SEJL), proudly announces that this high school class will be offered to promote Exploring Careers in Health and Human Services. Health care careers are some of the fastest growing occupations across the nation and the Yankton community is recognized as a regional leader in providing professional medical care. Successful completion of this class should support students' career decisions and their future pursuit of health and human service-related occupations.
