



## Spring Storm May Create Difficult Driving Conditions in Western SD

**RAPID CITY** — State Transportation and Public Safety officials are cautioning motorists that travel may become difficult, if not impossible, from late Saturday afternoon into Sunday evening across much of western South Dakota as a strong spring snow storm moves into the state.

Officials with the National Weather Service say snowfall amounts from six to 24 inches are expected throughout western South Dakota from Saturday afternoon until Sunday evening. North central areas of the state could see four to six inches and much of the rest of the state can expect heavy rainfall.

Along with the heavy, wet snow, strong winds from 20-35 mph, with gusts of 40-50 mph, will create areas of limited visibility and hazardous driving conditions, especially during the day on Sunday.

"Conditions are expected to deteriorate rapidly once the snow moves into the state," says Darin Bergquist, secretary of the Department of Transportation. "We are asking travelers to take this storm seriously and be prepared to alter travel plans over the Mother's Day weekend."

Officials are encouraging motorists to get where they are going before Saturday evening and consider delaying travel plans on Sunday, possibly into Monday, until the storm has passed and crews are able to clear the roadways.

Travelers are reminded that SDDOT crews will plow until early evening hours as conditions allow. After that, winter maintenance will be suspended and will resume about 5 a.m. the next morning, weather permitting.

Motorists who must travel should drive with extreme caution and are encouraged to visit [www.safetravelusa.com/sd](http://www.safetravelusa.com/sd) or dial 511 to check the latest road conditions and travel advisories before heading out.

## Yankton Municipal Cemetery Announces Spring Clean-Up

Yankton Municipal Cemetery announces that staff will be doing a spring clean-up at the cemetery. Staff will be going through all areas of the cemetery picking up anything that is in poor quality and anything that has been displaced and is on the grass. These items will then be disposed of at the time of removal. If there is a concern that an item may be removed by cemetery staff, please remove the item personally and refrain from placing back in the cemetery until Memorial Day.

In accordance with cemetery policy, any alterations to any lot shall be done by cemetery personnel. The City of Yankton retains the right to remove or alter any lot improvements if they become unsightly or pose a safety hazard. Any of these services should be requested thoughtthe Department of Parks and Recreation Office.

Fresh cut flowers, potted plants and wreaths shall not be allowed on grave lawns longer than three days, except during the period from Dec. 1 through March 1, and for the two weeks following Memorial Day. Unless removed by the owner within the above time the cemetery staff will remove all remaining items.

All urns, plant material, etc. will be in line with the headstone. One rod iron decoration per grave. The City of Yankton is not responsible for any object placed on or near headstones. No homemade or handmade monuments. Perpetual lights are not the responsibility of the City of Yankton, even if placed by monument company.

**WALL ST. RECAP**

The U.S. stock market had its best day in two months Friday following encouraging news about the job market. The surge was enough to push two of the three major indexes to gains for the week.

The Dow Jones industrial average added 267.05 points, or 1.5 percent, to 18,191.11.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index rose 28.10 points, or 1.4 percent, to 2,116.10.

The Nasdaq composite rose 58 points, or 1.2 percent, to 5,003.55.

The Dow rose 167.05 points, or 0.9 percent.

The S&P 500 index gained 7.81 points, or 0.4 percent.

Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle was up 2.13 cents to \$1.5150 a pound; August feeder cattle was .82 cents higher to \$2.1762 a pound; while June lean hogs were rose 1.32 cents to \$3.8482 a pound.
