The VA surveyors were comprised of an interdisciplinary team including three RNs, a Registered Dietician and a Life Safety Code expert from various parts of the country.

DHHS, some of the team's comments included: "Very clean and well maintained facility," "members and their families are happy and satisfied," and "the staff is top-notch and dedicated to the members they provide care to." One of the surveyors shared that a contract hospice nurse said "There's no place that compares to Norfolk Veterans' Home."

"Besides having a very competent and dedicated staff, the Norfolk Veterans' Home is also fortunate to have overwhelming support from our service organizations and hundreds of volunteers," according to Jerry Eisenhauer, the facility's administrator. Yankton City Commission To Consider A Water Development Agreement

The Yankton City Commission will consider a water development agreement with B-Y Water when the commission meets Monday.

The agreement will open the door to city development of properties, such as the proposed Westbrook Estates annexation.

"This is something we are really excited about, and I think it's something B-Y Water is really excited about," City Manager Amy Nelson said during a Friday media briefing.

The agreement creates a process for which water can be serviced to B-Y territory by the city until B-Y chooses

to provide the service.

"It could mean a lot for our future," Nelson said.

The city will also consider a rezoning of annex property for residential development.

Commissioners will also hear some requests for assistance with a special family-friendly biker event to be held in conjunction with the 75th anniversary of the Sturgis Motorcycle Rally in August.

Also Monday, commissioners will hold public hearings on several alcohol and beverage license requests. The City Commission will also adjourn and reconvene for the new calendar year. Nathan Johnson will be officially sworn in as a new

city commissioner. Pauline Akland is leaving the board Monday's meeting is at seven p.m. at the Technical Education Center, 1200 W. 21st St.

• During Friday's briefing, Nelson also reported that the eagles nesting along the Missouri River across from the collector well site at Paddlewheel Point have hatched some baby eagles. It is unknown how many have hatched at this time.

Earlier this spring, there was a concern that the work at the well site might disrupt the nesting eagles.

Graduate students from the University of South Dakota will continue to monitor the nest, Nelson said.

SD Public Notices Highlight Insurance Companies

BROOKINGS — In this newspaper you will find the publication of financial summaries of insurance companies licensed to do business in South Dakota.

Insurance companies doing business in South Dakota are required by state law to publish these financial summaries annually. The summary lists the insurance company's assets, liabilities, business in South Dakota for the year and the lines in which the company is authorized by the state of South Dakota to sell insurance.

"These public notices provide South Dakotans with information about an important segment of the financial industry doing business in our state," said David Bordeyck, general manager of South Dakota Newspaper Association. "Transparency and disclosure are important to South Dakotans and these public notices help fulfill that expectation."

The published insurance company financial statements from all South Dakota newspapers soon will be available at www.sdpublicnotices.com/.

This newspaper along with all other newspapers in the state and SDNA cooperate to provide the public notice website as a public service at no cost to state and local governments.

A statewide survey commissioned by SDNA in 2014 showed that 49 percent of South Dakotans read public notices printed in the local newspaper either frequently or at least sometimes. The same survey indicated that more than 60 percent of South Dakotans preferred public notices be published in the local newspaper vs. 16 percent in favor of government itself posting public notices only online.

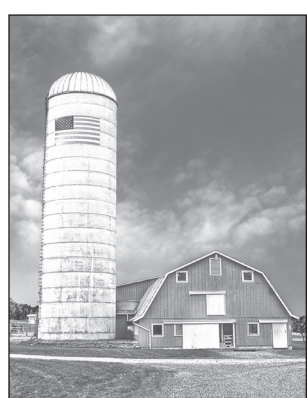
Quiz Bowl Encourages Youth To Think About Farm And Ranch Safety

HURON — Four FFA Chapters placed in the Farmers Union Team Up for Safety Quiz Bowl held in conjunction with the 2015 South Dakota State FFA Convention and will be advancing to the state competition held during the South Dakota State Fair.

The qualifying teams are, in order of highest score, the Viborg/Hurley FFA Chapter; the Parker FFA Chapter; the Deuel FFA Chapter and the Howard FFA Chapter. The Wolsey/Wessington FFA Chapter ranked fifth in points and will be the alternate team for the final round at the State Fair competition.

"The quiz bowl is a fun way for high school students to learn about safety on the farm or ranch," said Doug Sombke, South Dakota Farmers Union President, of the competition that asks FFA members questions on farm and ranch safety.

"We hope with the information they'll learn at the quiz bowl they'll be prepared if they're ever faced with

an emergency situation or if they're working with livestock or doing any other potentially dangerous job on the farm," he said.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, an estimated 1 million youth, under the age of 20, live on farms in the U.S. Over half of them do farm-related work. Sombke points out that agriculture is often listed among the most dangerous occupations in America. Because of the large machinery they work with, along with chemical

hazards, unpredictable livestock and enclosed spaces like grain bins that hold thousands of pounds of grain, farm workers face many risks.

The U.S. Department of Labor reported that in 2010 the injury rate for agricultural workers was over 20 percent higher than the rate for all workers. The department reported in 2009 alone that 440 farm workers died from work-related injuries.

"The risks are real, especially for young people on the farm or ranch," Sombke said. "Part of Farmers Union's mission is to educate young people about agriculture, and farm safety is very important part of that."

The teams who competed in the quiz bowl included FFA Chapters from the following towns/schools: Sunshine Bible Academy, Centerville, Chamberlain, Lennox, Dell Rapids, Lyman, Tri-Valley, McCook Central, Rutland, Miller, Gettysburg, Beresford and Marion.
