Storm Cuts So. Dakota In Two

From P&D and AP Reports

A stormy weekend across South Dakota divided the state in two, with a snowstorm in the west and tornadoes and thunderstorms in the east.

Beyond the damage in and around Delmont, the Yankton area saw mostly scattered thunderstorms with some hail reported.

The Yankton airport registered .73 of rain Sunday, with a majority of it falling overnight. A thunderstorm that rolled through town at about 1:45 p.m. brought with it pea- to marble-size hail and brief heavy rains that caused minor street flooding for a time.

Heavy rain was also report in Vermillion.

One report from Lincoln County recorded 2.10 inches of rain from an afternoon storm.

There were also tornado sightings at various East River locations, including Wagner and Ethan. Meanwhile, the West River snowstorm dumped more

than a foot of snow in the Black Hills.

The National Weather Service said, as of late Sunday afternoon, Lead reported 18 inches of snow, Deerfield 17 inches and downtown Rapid City 13.5 inches.

Snowfall in the Black Hills could total 2 feet by the time the system passes.

Meteorologist Kyle Carstens of the National Weather Service said the snow was not unusual for this time of year. He noted that this is the wettest time of the year for the Rapid City area, and temperatures have been hovering just below freezing.

But Carstens said the snow won't stay. Temperatures are expected to reach the 60s by mid-week.
