Coyote Golfers Set For Their 'Super Bowl' USD Men Begin NCAA Regional Today

Try as it might to treat this week's tournament just like any other, it's not exactly the same for the University of South Dakota men's golf team. This isn't the Coyote Classic.

Or the Jackrabbit Invite. It's the big stage

A week and a half after capturing their first Summit League championship, the Coyotes are out in Washington for the NCAA Bremerton Regional – their first regional appearance at the Division I level. The 3-day, 54-hole tournament begins today (Thursday) at Gold Mountain Golf Club.

"We're just all smiles," USD head coach Nick Hovden said after Wednesday's official practice round.

'We're soaking it all in.' It's not exactly a vacation for the Coyotes, however. As unlikely as it may seem that they would be among the five low teams to advance to the NCAA finals, there's still a sense that USD is playing with house money, according to junior Jordan Rykal.

"We have nothing to lose, we made it this far," Rykal said Wednesday. "To be honest, conference was kind of like our Super Bowl, and now this is a pretty special moment.'

Rykal is joined on the USD lineup by senior Samuel Matthew,

sophomore Cody Seal, freshman Matthew Swanson and freshman Cole Peterson.

The task of competing alongside the other qualified teams may seem daunting. Also at the regional are sixth-ranked South Carolina, No. 12 Washington, No. 17 Southern California, No. 18 Baylor, No. 30 UAB, No. 31 Texas Christian, No. 43 Iowa State and No. 44 Sam Houston State. The other teams in the field are Michigan, UC Davis, VCU, Pepperdine and Cleveland State.

The Coyotes will be paired today (Thursday) with Cleveland State and the five other individual golfers who qualified for the regional they're from Gonzaga, BYU, Oregon State, Minnesota and Pacific.

"Obviously we have high expectations, but like I told the guys, Fellas, just savor this, a lot of other teams would love to be out here,' Hovden said.

And yet, it's the Coyotes – who rallied to beat Oral Roberts for the Summit League title – who are out in Washington.

"It's pretty exciting stuff," Rykal said. "We're all trying to take it like any other tournament.'

As it tough as it may have seemed Wednesday, as the Coyotes looked up at the scoreboard and saw their school listed alongside those high-major programs.

"I'm not going to lie, it's a little intimidating," Hovden said. "But the kids are doing a fine job. We're trying to treat this just like another tournament; another round of golf.' The problem, though, is that it's

not just another round of golf. Consider: USD will be golfing with Byron Meth (Pacific), who

earlier this year competed at The Masters. It may not be the usual company the Čoyotes keep out on a golf course, and while you wouldn't have any problems convincing them this is a new level, they're ready for the challenge.

"It's neat to see our names on the scoreboard with the big dogs, but not for a second do we feel like we don't belong here," Hovden said.

HARTINGTON, Neb. — At the Nebraska District D-3 track meet on Wednesday in Hartington, Wausa finished in first place for the boys while Allen took home first place for the girls.

Nine schools competed in the event including Allen, Bancroft-Rosalie, Lyons-Decatur Northeast, Omaha Nation, Randolph, Walthall, Wausa, Winside, and Wynot.

Austin Hegge from Wausa said having someone else from his school in an event with him allows him to push his teammates more.

"I think I push them more than they wanna be pushed. It helps them get better," Hegge said.

Hegge also said he has ways of preparing before every track meet.

"Ŵe have a workout before every normal practice. I'll have a teammate stretch me and do a full body stretch," Hegge said. Hegge finished first place

O'NEILL, Neb. – The Bloomfield Bees qualified two athletes in three events for the Nebraska State Track Meet following Wednesday's action at the District D-4 meet in O'Neill.

Elkhorn Valley won the boys' team title with 103 points, beating out North Central (83).

Bloomfield's Conner Wilson qualified for state by finishing second in the 200-me-ter dash (23.53) and second in the 400-meter dash (53.69). Teammate Kyle Young did the same by taking second in the pole vault (10-6).

The Bees also took second in the 400 relay (47.29) and 1600 relay (3:38.28), but won't know if those relays qualified for state until later.

On the girls' side, St. Mary's won the team title with 151.5 points, well in front of North Central (105.75).

Field Championships. Wilkes cleared 13 feet, 3 ¼ inches with the fewest misses to reclaim her crown. Sophomore Emily Brigham had one more miss at a lower bar to finish runner-up while also making it over 13-3 34. Indoor league champion freshman Sierra Maddox tied for fourth with a height of 12-10. Freshman Madeline Aune and junior Janelle Noga took seventh and eighth, respectively, at 12-4. The Coyotes grabbed a total of 25.5 points in the event.

South Dakota added 24 more points in the 10,000 meters with a podium sweep. Eichkorn led the way by defending her title in a Summit League Championship meet record time of 35:18.59. The men also took two spots on the 10,000-meter podium. Senior Brant Haase clocked 30:27.57 to finish runner-up, while junior Mubarik Musa placed third in 30:51.54.

Noga added a fifth-place finish in the javelin with a career best throw of 129-10. Sophomore Amelia Miller threw 127-6 for sixth place.

Sophomore Danielle Waldner finished seventh in the hammer throw with a mark of 160-11. Junior Kayla Johnson finished eighth in 154-8.

The Coyotes grabbed another point in the javelin when sophomore Jet Moreland threw the javelin 180-4 for eighth.
