Highway Patrol Remembers Fallen

PIERRE — South Dakota's Highway Patrol is spending this Law Enforcement Memorial Week remembering the five Highway Patrol troopers who have died in the line of duty. "We can never forget the service of these troopers and all of the other law enforcement officers who have died in the line of duty," said Colonel Craig Price, the Highway Patrol's superintendent. "They showed heroism and courage. They paid the ultimate sacrifice while protecting others." The five are: • Patrolman Bernard Benson, died in the line of duty, Sept. 17, 1941; • Patrolman H.N. "Brownie" Russell, died in the line of duty, Nov. 19, 1958; • Trooper Verlyn Mettler, died in the line of duty, March 9, 1976; • Trooper Steven Hoffman, died in the line of duty, March 12, 1980; and, • Trooper Oren Hindman, died in the line of duty, May 2, 1985.

The names of the five are listed on the Law Enforcement Memorial at Capitol Lake in Pierre as well as on a memorial in front of the state Department of Public Safety building in Pierre, which houses the Highway Patrol. Law enforcement officers from across South Dakota will attend the annual Law Enforcement Memorial ceremony Wednesday in Pierre.

**WALL ST. RECAP**

Encouraging news on the U.S. job market and inflation helped lift U.S. stocks higher on Thursday, snapping a three-day slump for the Dow Jones industrial average and the Standard & Poor's 500 index. The rally pushed the S&P 500 to its latest record high, while the Dow came within 36 points of its own record. Technology stocks were among the biggest gainers.

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"One of the things we had to redo was, we thought we could narrow the hallway up on the second floor," he said. "The National Park Service was not OK with that, so we redesigned the apartment units' layout — leaving the hallway the same as it is today." He added that the layout change actually led to additional apartment units over the original plan. "Now we have 21 residential units," he said. "We had 17 in our original plans, so we're just going with some smaller sizes." Another element of the building is 3,000 square feet of commercial space. Froehlich said while, there's nothing set for that space at the moment, this was anticipated. "We've got no one that's planning on moving into that," he said. "We thought that might be the case. A lot of commercial people want to know that the project is real before they move in. A lot of them want to see the space before they decide whether it will work for them. We had the assumption going into (the project) that we needed to lead with residential. ... We think we'll attract a commercial tenant after we get the residential done." He added there have been discussions with possible commercial clients. "We've had a few conversations — just no one serious enough to spend a lot of time on it," he said. Last November, Froehlich presented the plans for the post office during a meeting of One Million Cups, after which he told the Press & Dakotan that while his

Delmont was hit with a EF-2 tornado shortly before 11 a.m. on Mother's Day, with peak winds of 130 miles per hour. The twister carved a path 17.3 miles long with an estimated path 400 yards wide. Nine persons were injured and received hospitalization, but the tornado didn't claim any fatalities. Water was restored to the town, and the boil water order was lifted Thursday. Electricity has been restored to about 75 percent of the Delmont. The west end of the town was hit particularly hard, including the destruction of the century-old Zion Lutheran Church and the new fire hall which had not yet been dedicated. The eastern part of the community remains intact. In other developments, state officials say the lifting of the boil water order means the community's water is safe for residents to use. Residents are now able to use the water for drinking, bathing and cooking. A Boil Water Order was issued by the South Dakota Department of Environment and Natural Resources after Sunday's tornado disrupted the city's water supply. Water samples were tested and deemed safe, according to state officials. The safe samples demonstrate that response efforts to bring the water distribution system back on line after loss of pressure related to tornado damage were effective. Delmont officials have established a relief fund as the community works to recover from Sunday's tornado. Cash donations designated to the Delmont Disaster Relief Fund can be dropped off at First State Bank locations in Delmont, Tripp, Armour and Geddes. Donations can also be mailed to First State Bank, P.O. Box 68, Delmont, SD 57330.

**BOARD OF TRADE**

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly higher Thursday on the Chicago Board of Trade. Wheat for July delivery advanced 32.75 cents to \$5.1425 a bushel; July corn rose 5.75 cents to 3.68 a bushel; July oats were up 11.75 cents to 2.4750 a bushel; while July soybeans fell .25 cent to \$9.57 a bushel. Beef was higher and pork was lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle was up 1.83 cents to \$1.5380 a pound; August feeder cattle was 1.33 cents higher to \$2.1895 a pound; while June lean hogs fell .82 cent to \$8.395 a pound.
