

"We've talked to Jimmy John's, Scooters, Red (Steakhouse) in Vermillion and Dunkin Donuts as well," he said. Froehlich said there isn't a definite set timeframe for completion.

We're keyed up and ready to go once we get final approval," he said.

He estimated it would take around eight months for completion of the project.
