**USD Men's Golf Ends Season At NCAA Regionals**

**BREMERTON, Wash.**—South Dakota's men's golf team finished in 14th place with a three-round total score of 898 (+34) at the NCAA Bremerton Regional. A total of 75 golfers from 14 teams and five individuals competed over three days at the Gold Mountain Golf Course in Bremerton.

Sophomore Cody Seal led South Dakota throughout the regional. He had 71 strokes on Saturday for a total score of 218, which placed him in a three-way tie for 30th.

With the Coyotes low round on Saturday, freshman Matthew Swanson's six birdies moved him up the individual rankings 15 spots to 46th place. Swanson shot a total of 222.

Washington's Cheng-Tsung Pan won the individual title with 203 strokes. UAB, South Carolina, Southern California, TCU and Washington secured the top-five team spots and advance to the finals in Bradenton, Fla.

This was the Coyotes' first appearance at an NCAA regional meet since 2003 and the program's first at the Division I level.

**MMC Women's Tennis Puts Three On NAIA Scholar-Athletes List**

Three members of the Mount Marty College women's tennis team were among 135 players nationally to be named 2015 Daktronics-NAIA Women's Tennis Scholar-Athletes, according to a release last week.

The Mount Marty players recognized were Vanessa Rockne (Yankton), Lauren Janssen (Sioux City, Iowa) and

Kelsey Lentz (Hartington, Nebraska).

In order to be nominated, a student-athlete must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale and must have achieved junior academic status.

Morningside led the Great Plains Athletic Conference with four selections, while Concordia, Midland, Nebraska Wesleyan and Northwestern all had one selection.

**Augustana's Bormann 58th At NCAA Division II Golf**

ALLEDALE, Mich. — Augustana women's golf concluded the 2014-15 season with an 11th-place finish at the NCAA Division II National Championship shooting a four-round score of 138-over-par 1290 (334-321-317-318) after shooting a 30-over-par 318 in the final round on Saturday. Augustana made its seventh NCAA Championship appearance in program history.

The University of Indianapolis captured the National Championship shooting a 60-over-par 1212 (305-299-309-299) matching its four-round low score of 111-over-par 299. Rollins College took second firing a tournament-low round of five-over-par 293 on Saturday to finish five strokes off the lead at 65-over-par 1217 (306-314-304-293).

Midwestern State's Brenna Moore won individual medalist honors shooting nine-over-par 297 (74-73-74-76) for the tournament.

Sierra Langlie was Augustana's highest finisher at the national tournament shooting a 28-over-par 316 (80-75-80-81) to tie for 42nd on the individual leaderboard. Langlie carded a nine-over-par 81 in today's final round.

Also for Augustana, Jordan Bormann (Parkston) tied for 58th individually. Bormann fired a nine-over 81 this afternoon to bring her 72-hole total to 40-over-par 328 (83-84-80-81).

**Wrestler Who Lost His Leg After Crash Hopes To Recover**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) — The Nebraska high school wrestling champion who lost his left leg after a car accident this spring is looking forward to his recovery and attending the University of Wyoming in the fall.

But first Doyle Trout graduated from Centennial High School Saturday afternoon and received a standing ovation as he received his diploma.

The four-time Nebraska state champion told the Lincoln Journal Star he's been overwhelmed by all the sup-

port he has received since the April 5 accident and hasn't even had time to read all the letters.

"I didn't know so many people knew me," Doyle Trout said, reaching for one of several stacks of letters around the house.

Wyoming is honoring Trout's scholarship, and he hopes to wrestle again someday but doing that won't be easy.

Trauma surgeon Reginald Burton said Trout's life was saved by his seat belt when his

left leg was crushed and his right leg broken.

"Doyle is a very strong person, too. Pretty amazing perspective for a young man his age," Burton said.

Trout is still a week or two away from being able to put any weight on his broken right leg. Then he will be fitted for a prosthetic leg and begin his long rehabilitation.

He'll spend all summer working to strengthen his legs and learn to walk with the new prosthetic.

**Ducks Knock Off Blackhawks 4-1**

ANAHEIM, Calif. (AP) — Frederick Andersen lunged forward and stretched out his stick, taking a desperate chance to stop Patrick Kane. The Chicago star's shot somehow glanced off Andersen's lumber and flew over a painfully open net.

Andersen kept the Anaheim Ducks in the Western Conference finals opener while his teammates got rolling. When they did, the Ducks streaked out to yet another early series lead.

Hampus Lindholm, Nate Thompson and Jakob Silfverberg each had a goal and an assist, and the Ducks beat the Blackhawks 4-1 in Game 1 on Sunday.

Andersen made 32 saves and Kyle Palmieri also scored as the Ducks opened their first conference finals in eight years by improving to 9-1 in these Stanley Cup playoffs. Although the Blackhawks clearly are a major step up in

competition, the Ducks' confidence grew with a strong all-around performance backed by brilliance from their imposing Danish goalie.

"I think everyone in the locker room knows we can beat this team," said Andersen, who's in his second NHL season. "It's a good feeling that we showed it in Game 1. They're going to come harder. We'll have to play better in Game 2."

Game 2 is Tuesday night in Anaheim.

Andersen had to be stellar under a heavy barrage of high-quality shots from the Blackhawks, who had won five straight postseason games heading into their third straight conference finals. Kane scored seven goals in the first two rounds, but could only shake his head on the bench after Andersen's phenomenal stick save in the first period.

"He's a battler, and you

saw that on numerous saves he had tonight when it seemed like we had a good chance to score and he gets a leg or a stick on it," Kane said. "We knew that was the scouting report on him. Just got to bear down a little bit more on those opportunities."

Brad Richards scored late in the second period and Corey Crawford stopped 23 shots for Chicago, which hadn't lost since April 23.

Both teams' offensive stars were shut down in the franchise's first postseason meetings, but the Ducks' supporting cast took over the scoring, capped by Silfverberg's empty-net goal with 1:18 left.

Andersen also made a handful of spectacular saves in the third when Chicago pressed after Thompson made it 3-1 with 7:55 to play in a sequence created by speedy Andrew Coglianò.
