BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were lower Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery declined 11.50 cents to \$5.1025 a bushel; July corn was off 6 cents to 3.62 a bushel; July oats were 5.50 cents lower to 2.48 a bushel; while July soybeans lost 8.25 cents to \$9.4625 bushel.

Beef was higher and pork was lower on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle was up .40 cent to \$151.97 a pound; August feeder cattle was .43 cent higher to \$2.1715 a pound; while June lean hogs fell .25 cent to \$8.215 a pound.

U.S. stocks drifted mostly lower Tuesday, led by declines in energy stocks as the price of oil dropped for a fifth day in a row. The Dow Jones industrial average had its fourth straight gain.

The Dow Jones industrial average rose 13.51 points, or 0.1 percent, to 18,312.39.

The Standard & Poor's 500 index lost 1.37 points, less than 0.1 percent, to 2,127.83.

The Nasdaq composite dipped 8.41 points, or 0.2 percent, to 5,070.03.

world," he said. "The focus is to get it out to people in about an eight-county region around Yankton. We have just as many opportunities — or better — than any other surrounding community."

bridge. I think we need to look at our bridges first because they aren't all on heavily traveled highways — they're off the beaten path — but during the spring and fall, they do get tortured."

Commission chairman Todd Woods agreed with Gustad's assessment.

"The bridges are more of a priority than the roads, because if the bridges are defective, what's the point of having a road to nowhere?" Woods said.

Tuesday was also set to be a date when the commission was to field a resolution regarding a proposed Yankton County regional rail authority. However, the commissioners chose to continue the matter to the next meeting as they try to find potential candidates to name as the fifth

member on a potential rail board.

"What we're trying to do right now is to make sure we have a nice list of names of people who are not elected officials — whether they're in the city or the county — so we can have a list of names of people to pull from who are willing to serve," Woods said.

The rail authority issue is also set to have a public hearing during next Tuesday's meeting of the Yankton City Commission.

In other business Tuesday, the commission:

- * Approved the formation of a Yankton County Housing Redevelopment Commission.
- * Created a four-way stop intersection at 452nd Ave. and Iverson St. near Gayville.
- * Approved publication of an E911 directory both online and in print form.

Missing Inmate Caught After Chase

SIoux FALLS (AP) — Authorities say an inmate who had walked away from a South Dakota prison has been captured after leading police on separate chases in three states.

Lincoln County Sheriff's Department Sgt. Terry Anderson says 36-year-old David Holloway was taken into custody Monday night south of Sioux Falls. He tells the *Argus Leader* that Holloway was not armed and there was no standoff.

Authorities say Holloway was driving a pickup reported as stolen in Nebraska. KDLT-TV reports authorities there chased him but he escaped.

Sioux Falls police say Holloway was spotted in Iowa and authorities pursued him as he drove into South Dakota.

The South Dakota Department of Corrections had reported Holloway as missing May 10. The department says he's serving sentences for grand theft and eluding a police officer.
