

VERMILLION — The Emergency Room entrance at Sanford Medical Center Vermillion (17 Walker St.) will be closing due to the start of construction on the east side of the medical center campus. Once new directional signage is placed on Tuesday, May 19, all patients, visitors and vendors will be instructed to enter the medical center through the main entrance at 20 S Plum St.

All community members are asked to pay close attention to new directional signs posted for parking and the temporary entrance location. During this construction period, it is asked that everyone observe our hospital visiting hours of 6 a.m. to 8 p.m.

Entry to Sanford Clinic Vermillion and parking has not changed.

During phase one of construction at Sanford Vermillion, new facilities are being added, including new pharmacy and laundry departments and the addition of an ambulance garage at the Emergency Room entrance.

The Vermillion Public Library has received some of these magnets from another source, but they are only a free distribution site and the Library does not benefit financially. The caller, who identified himself as Michael Harris, may claim to have a signed contract with the business, but based on information from the Police Department, it may not be a signed contract, but rather a verbal agreement to review the contract.

Be aware that the Vermillion Area Chamber & Development Company does not have any type of agreement with this company.

was killed in the line of duty, when Officer Jason "Tye" Pratt was shot and killed in September 2003, while chasing down a fleeing suspect. The suspect, 21-year-old Albert Rucker of Omaha, was in turn shot and killed by another officer.

Orozco is the first female Omaha police officer to die in the line of duty, according to a list on the Officer Down Memorial online page.

Besides her daughter, Orozco is survived by her husband, Hector Orozco, two stepchildren ages 6 and 7, her mother and two siblings.

Kerrie Orozco coached baseball at an Omaha Boys and Girls Club, was a Special Olympics volunteer and served as president of the Police Officers' Ball to benefit the Special Olympics, the chief said. She also took in rescue dogs and was a Girl Scout mentor.

"She was a friend, a popular officer," Schmaderer said. "I just can't even imagine that this has happened. The city of Omaha owes her and her family a debt of gratitude."

Dr. Michael Wagner, a trauma critical care surgeon at the hospital, said his team provided "aggressive care" to both Orozco and Wheeler, but neither could be revived. Paramedics had performed CPR on both the officer and the suspect as they were taken to the hospital.

Tiffany Atkins, who lives less than a block from where the shooting happened, said she heard between five and 10 shots Wednesday afternoon in the Florence neighborhood in north Omaha, made up mostly of Tudor-style brick homes along tree-lined streets. She said she took shelter in her basement and heard police cars swarming the scene within seconds of the shooting.

"I was raised in this neighborhood," Atkins said. "This makes me want to move."

WALL ST. RECAP

The stock market showed little life on Wednesday as it closed yet another trading day barely changed from the day before. Major indexes rallied a bit after the Federal Reserve released minutes from its last meeting, but mostly gave up the gains toward the close. It was the fourth day in a row that the Standard and Poor's 500 index moved less than one-half of one percentage point.
