OMAHA. Neb. - The Crofton girls' track team leads Class C in points after day one Friday of the Nebraska State Meet at Omaha Burke Stadium in Omaha.

Crofton got off to a quick start in the morning by winning the 3200-meter relay. The team, made up of Kelsey Šanger, Allison Arens, Monica Arens, and Quinn Wragge, led the whole way and was able to cruise to a victory.

"It's bittersweet, it's my last state meet, but it doesn't get old winning," team anchor Wragge said.

Meanwhile Crofton's Maria Wortmann was finishing in second in discus with a season best throw of 134-feet, 6 inches.

"I was ranked second com-

ing in and was like, maybe I'll have a chance to win." Wortmann said. "I threw the best I

have all year, I'm happy where I placed. Also earning points for Crofton were Haley Arens and Allison Arens, who finished third and fourth respectively,

in the 3200-meter run. Sadie Peterson of Laurel-Concord-Coleridge came into the 3200 ranked first and finished in seventh.

"It was a tough race, there was some good competition out there," Peterson said. "I just wanted to go out there and

run and do my best." LCC's Ellie Arduser ran well enough to qualify for the 200-meter dash and 400-meter dash finals on Saturday, but missed out on the 100-meter dash final by one-hundredth of a second. Arduser is also competing in the triple jump

on Saturday. "Missing the 100 is OK, because I like the 200 and 400 better, so as long as I make the finals in those I am fine." Arduser said. "Triple jump I'm hoping I'll do really good because I'm leading the state right now, so I'm hoping I'll jump a 36 again." On the boys' side Harting-

ton-Newcastle's Griffon Kalin was able to qualify for today's (Saturday) 300-meter hurdles finals.

"It wasn't my best time but I qualified," Kalin said. "It's a tougher competition than last year.

"Pressure is off, at least I made it so I just have to finish it off tomorrow."

D: Wynot Girls Take 3200 Relay

OMAHA, Neb. — When Cortney Arkfeld got the baton with 800 meters remaining in a 3200-meter relay, her team was in sixth place.

Not exactly a position where the Blue Devils were thinking state title.

Arkfeld, one of three sophomores on the 4-person relay, instead rallied Wynot to first place in the Class D two-mile relay on Friday at the Nebraska State Track Meet in Omaha.

Wynot even being in sixth place when Arkfeld got the baton was impressive enough, considering the Blue Devils came in with the 12th-

best seed time. Instead, they clocked a school-record time of 10:07.91.

"I didn't know if I would," Arkfeld said. "I was just aiming to catch up to them.'

Wynot's relay began with senior Jenna Heine, who passed the baton to sophomore Holly Lauer, who passed it to sophomore Skylar Arkfeld. By the time Cortney Arkfeld got it, the Blue Devils were understandably nervous.

"I saw she (Skylar) closed the gap and we weren't far behind," Cortney said. "I knew we still had a chance at this."

And that because they had Cortney, one of the state's top Class D middledistance runners — she later qualified for the 400-meter dash finals with the best prelim time.

"It was nerve-wracking," said Heine, who recovered from a fall in her final 200 meters. "But I trust my teammates.

"I would've been happen with whatever place we got." Even sixth place?

"Sure," Heine said, smiling.

The previous Wynot High School girls' record in the 3200 relay was 10:18, but that was shortly replaced. "It was amazing," Cortney

said. "We didn't think we'd get that."

Bucks 7th Entering Final Day

SIOUX FALLS - Yankton's Paul Fanta advanced to the flight four singles semifinals with a 6-3, 6-0 victory over Aberdeen Roncalli's Luke Lingor on Friday at the South Dakota State Boys' Tennis Tournament on Friday in Sioux Falls.

Sparked by Fanta's play, Yankton held on to seventh place entering the final day of the tournament. The Bucks sit 18.5 points behind Aberdeen Central for sixth, and lead eighth place Brandon Valley by 49 points. Sioux Falls Lincoln leads

with 494 points, followed by Mitchell (466) and O'Gorman (446).

"Paul played very well. He was aggressive and got to the net early," said Yankton head coach Matt Termansen. "He just took the Roncalli kid out of the match.

Fanta, the fourth seed, now faces top-seeded Wil McDowell of Sioux Falls O'Gorman. They have not met this season, as the Yankton-O'Gorman dual was rained out.

"McDowell is an eighth grader who hits good strokes, but he's tiny," Termansen said. "Hopefully Paul can get to the net early.

Yankton's flight two singles duo of Fanta and Jason Shindler will play for third place after beating Sioux Falls Washington 7-6 (7-3), 6-0 in the quarterfinals before falling to Sioux Falls Lincoln 7-6 (7-1), 6-3 in the semifinals. The Bucks will face Mitchell one last time after splitting with the Eastern South Dakota Conference rival during the regular season. Shindler went 3-0 on Friday to advance to the consolation finals at flight two singles, beating Logan Aukes of Sioux Falls Christian (10-1), D'Kota Segrist of Rapid City Central (10-7) and Adam Zimmerman of Aberdeen Central (11-10, 7-5 tiebreaker). Shindler will face Matt Gauger of Watertown in the consolation final.

There were a lot of quality points, and Jason pulled it out in the tiebreaker, Termansen said. "He's super

pumped about that." Yankton will also play for a consolation title at flight three doubles, as Ethan Klimisch and Nathan List beat Brookings 10-2 and Pierre 11-10 (7-5) to earn a matchup with Madison.

'They had lost to both of those teams earlier in the season," Termansen said. 'They were due – they had lost a lot of tiebreakers during the season, and they beat Pierre in a tiebreaker.'


