WATERTOWN — High school boys from across South Dakota will be arriving in Aberdeen on Monday, June 1, as the 73rd annual session of the South Dakota American Legion Boys State will convene on the campus of Northern State University. The program will conclude Friday, June 5.
More than 300 high school students, who have just

completed their junior year, will arrive on the NSU campus on June 1 for registration and the opening of the American Legion Boys State. The week-long session, part of The American Legion's Americanism Program, is one of the most-respected and selective educational programs of government instruction for high school students in the nation. South Dakota American Legion Boys State started in Aberdeen in 1940 and continued through 1942. World War II made it necessary to drop the activity from 1943-1945, but in 1946 South Dakota American Legion Boys State was resumed.

It is a participatory program where each boy becomes a part of the operation of his local, county and state government. The boys were exposed to the rights and privileges, the duties and responsibilities of a citizen. The training was objective and practical with city, county and state government operated by elected and appointed officials duly placed in office by the participants. Activities include legislative sessions, court proceedings, law enforcement presentations, assemblies, bands, chorus and recreational

Participants were selected by local American Legion Posts following recommendations by school officials. In most cases, the expenses associated with attendance were paid by a sponsoring American Legion Post, a local business or another community-based organization.

Approximately 60 volunteer staff members consisting of Legionnaires and educators, along with civic and government leaders participate as counselors and advisors during the week-long program.

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For example, Gough said, carbon dioxide emissions now are being regulated by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency. He said South Dakota was aligned with the losing side in what's known as the Massachusetts decision reached by the U.S. Supreme Court.

One of the witnesses planned by Intertribal COUP was identified in commission filings as Dr. James Hansen, a former director for the NASA Goddard Institute for Space Studies and now a faculty member at Columbia University where he runs a program in climate science, awareness and solutions.

Commission chairman Chris Nelson expressed some hesitancy about banning all three witnesses altogether because they might have information to offer in rebuttal to other points brought up at the hearing.

But commissioner Hanson said the topics identified by Intertribal COUP focused on climate issues. That led to a 3-0 vote in favor of TransCanada.

TransCanada also succeeded Tuesday in fighting off a motion by various pipeline opponents that sought to severely penalize the company over its treatment of information discovery requests by opponents.

Commissioners voted 3-0 to deny a motion seeking to prohibit TransCanada from presenting any witnesses or evidence.

"It appears to me TransCanada has acted in good faith in compliance with our standards," commissioner Kristie Fiegen said.

Hanson said the sanction request "is just far, far, reaching far beyond"the discovery disputes.
