

Watch Out For Poison Plants This Summer

OMAHA, Neb. — As the seasons change so do the types of calls coming into the Nebraska Regional Poison Center. This is a good time to review a common summer-time poison.

Poison ivy, poison oak and poison sumac can release a substance called urushiol when the leaves or other parts of the plant are damaged or burned. Almost 85 percent of people exposed to the oil will have an allergic reaction and it only takes a very small amount of oil to cause a reaction. Typically there will be an itchy, red rash with bumps and blisters.

Poison ivy isn't contagious unless you spread the oil from person to person. But keep in mind that pets can carry the oil from the plant on their fur and pass the oil to any human coming in contact with them. Garden tools and sporting equipment should always be rinsed off. The urushiol can linger for years on a surface if it isn't washed off with water.

The poison ivy rash doesn't spread to other parts of the body unless you haven't washed properly and have

- the oil still on your hands or under your fingernails.
- TIPS ON POISON IVY

 - Recognize what poison ivy looks like: "Leaves of three let them be" or "1, 2, 3 let it be" are catchy phrases to help you remember.
 - Wash your hands with soap and cool water as soon as possible if you come in contact with poison ivy.
 - Wear long sleeves and pants and impermeable gloves when working in areas you think may have poison ivy.
 - Wash any exposed clothing immediately.
 - Wash garden tools and gloves often.
 - Don't scratch your rash as it can cause an infection.
 - Lukewarm baths with a colloidal oatmeal preparation may help relieve the itching.
 - Applying cool compresses, calamine lotion, or hydrocortisone cream may also help to relieve the itchy skin.

USD Law Student Appointed to Group

VERMILLION — A University of South Dakota School of Law student has been appointed to a national American Bar Association group focused on intellectual property.

Third-year law student Abby Leach of Albert Lea, Minn., will serve two years as vice chairwoman and then one year as chairwoman of the Law Student Action Group in the Intellectual Property Section of the ABA.

As part of her duties, the ABA will send Leach and 15 other law students from around the country to two ABA intellectual property conferences each year, one in Bethesda, Md., and one in Chicago at the group's annual convention. The law student reporters will tweet, blog, and post on Facebook about the continuing legal education sessions they attend.

Leach's appointment stemmed from her interest in patent law, and she'll sit for the patent bar in July.

"Patent law is just one of the many diverse areas of law that students pursue. This appointment demonstrates the dedication and drive our students have and shows they operate not just on a local or regional level but also at the national level as professionals," said Tom Geu, dean of the USD School of Law.

The Law Student Action Group (LSAG) is a committee of law students under the ABA Section of Intellectual Property, led by young lawyers and law students, whose goal is immediate broadcast of many section opportunities, including involvement in committees, publications and programming.

WALL ST. RECAP

Stocks ended higher, recovering the most of their losses from the day before, as Greece appeared closer to resolving its latest debt problems. However, the overall market remains directionless as most investors are focused on figuring out when the Federal Reserve's long-awaited interest rate increase may come.

CHICAGO (AP) — Grain futures were mostly lower Wednesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.

Wheat for July delivery declined 5.75 cents to \$4.8775 a bushel; July corn was off 5.50 cents to 3.4950 a bushel; July oats were 2 cents lower to 2.3650 a bushel; while July soybeans rose 4.50

cents to \$9.27 bushel.

Beef and pork were higher on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. June live cattle was up .67 cent to \$152.47 a pound; August feeder cattle was 1.82 cents higher to \$2.2142 a pound; while June lean hogs rose .60 cent to \$3.877 a pound.
