



• A dying man drove a car into the rear ranks of a Halloween parade in Anoka, Minn., where nearly 5,000 children had congregated for the parade. The car finally rolled to a stop in front of a funeral home, where the driver, now dead, slumped over the steering wheel to sound a continuous horn blast. Eight people were hospitalized and two died as a result of the incident.
