by the time emergency crews arrived.

"They were checked over by an ambulance crew on the South Dakota side," Nickles said. "The two men, other than being shook up and cold from the 57-degree water, were fine.'

A call was made to U.S. Army Corps of Engineers personnel at Gavins Point. They shut down the spillway to reduce the danger while the boat was retrieved.

Yankton Search and Rescue undertook the job of escorting the boat back to shore. "Once we got hooked up to

the capsized boat, it took a good 45 minutes to an hour to get it to shore," said Jake Lammers, director of Search and Rescue. "The boat was like a parachute full of water, and it would take us the opposite direction we wanted to go, so it took a while.'

He noted that it is the fourth weekend of the last five that his team has been called out to duty along the Missouri River. Other recent incidents requiring their assistance have included a truck that rolled down the embankment below Gavins Point and

killed Edward Metter before becoming submerged in the river and recovering the body of Richard McCorkindale after the skid loader he was driving fell into the river near Wynot, Neb.

Prior to the recent spate of incidents, Search and Rescue had not been called out since before the flooding along the Missouri River, Lammers said.

Ultimately, the capsized boat was guided to a boat ramp on the South Dakota shore, and a wrecker flipped it over.

Nickles said it did not sustain damage besides being submerged in the water.
