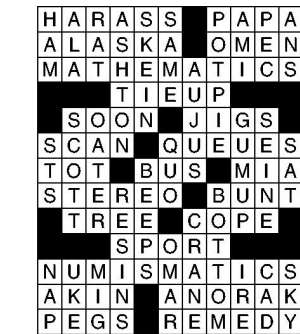

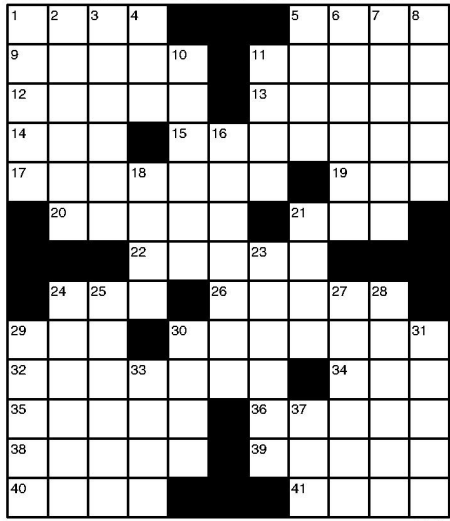

are doing and help somebody at the same time."

Sunday's lineup includes the following:

- Noon to 1 p.m. King's Musicians, a gospel group from Tyndall;
- 1-2 p.m. Pisgah Mountain String Band from the Yankton area;
- 2-3 p.m. Hungry Five of Tyndall, who play polkas and waltzes;
- 3-4 p.m. Guest singers, each performing three songs. The singers are Kim Soukup, Wagner; Vern Kaul, Springfield; Brenda George, Avon; Howard Grimm, Lynch, Neb.; and Ken Skokan, Tyndall.
- 4-5 p.m. Harvey's One Man Band, Tripp;
- 5-6 p.m. Bumble Bees of Tyndall.

The jamboree arose out of desperate need for food pantry donations, Mann said.

"We used to do the breakfasts and soup kitchens (as fundraisers), but then we got away from it. The attendance just wasn't there," Mann said.

"Gary Gibson and I have been friends for years, and he recommended (the jamboree). It was something they tried up at Chamberlain. We put it on, and everybody loved it. It was something different."

The jamboree has become an immediate success, with about 300 people attending each year, Mann said.

"What makes it so great is that people can come and go," she said. "They don't have to sit the whole time. We only ask for a non-perishable item as admission."

Gibson hopes for an even greater response and welcomes people from the entire region, not just Bon Homme County.

"This year, we are hoping to have a much bigger turnout and more food. We need a lot of food," he said.

Mann spent Tuesday afternoon looking with relief at a well-stocked food pantry. However, looks are deceiving, as the shelves were nearly empty just a few days before, she said.

"We have had three food drives in

the past week," she said. "We had the Boy Scouts in Scotland and the youth group from St. Leo's Catholic Church in Tyndall (conduct food drives). And the Lions Club at Springfield held their bingo this past weekend and brought in 15 to 18 nice boxes."

"After they brought all this in, we went from all empty shelves to all full. This is a good sized food pantry," she added.

The Bon Homme County food pantry serves and draws donations from Avon, Springfield, Scotland and Tabor as well as the Tyndall community housing the facility, Mann said.

In addition, the Hoch Foundation of Tyndall provides \$2,000 annually for the food pantry, Mann added.

Not all donated items are food, she said, pointing to a tray of toiletries and beauty products donated by an Avon salon. Some donated items cannot be purchased with food stamps, she said.

The food pantry has one restriction in that it doesn't accept expired or outdated food or other items, Mann said.

She expects another run on the food pantry with the arrival of fall and winter.

"We get busier when school starts, and the colder weather comes in and people are trying to buy fuel oil," she said. "The home is running out of food. Most of the people are on food stamps, but they don't last long enough."

Sunday's benefit will provide welcome publicity for the food pantry, Mann said.

"I don't think (many) people realize that we are here," she said. "We aren't allowed to advertise. It just has to be word of mouth or a referral from the welfare office."

The food pantry is open 8 a.m. to noon Wednesdays, but Mann will open the facility when she receives calls from Social Services or ministers with people in need. Mann or her assistant, Pat McCann, sign in the persons receiving assistance and walk them through the pantry to select the allowed quantity of food, based on family size.

Money woes have affected not only the food pantry but also some area senior nutrition centers, Mann added.

The food pantry welcomes all kinds of non-perishable goods, McCann said. The facility doesn't have a refrigerator or freezer, therefore it doesn't take meat or frozen items.

The food pantry also provides monthly commodity boxes for those who meet age and income guidelines, Mann said.

"With the commodity boxes, they take home a 35-pound box with 20 to 25 items," she said. "Right now, we are down to 32 boxes. We have no money for commodity boxes. We used to get money from the state, but the state has no money for the food pantry and the federal government has cut back."

The food pantry distributes about \$90-100 of food monthly to each family, she said.

The pantry also provides 40 to 60 Christmas boxes for needy families, Mann said. The boxes offer breakfast food, fruit, vegetables and soup. The boxes have included a turkey, but this year's boxes may instead provide a ham, she said.

"We rely heavily on private donations," she said. "We have got to keep our doors open to help these people."

That's where Sunday's jamboree comes in, providing a valuable influx of cash and food items, Gibson said. He and the other entertainers gladly give up one afternoon to help those in need.

"I love to do this, I really do. It's not work. It's a lot of fun," he said. "If a lot of people (at the jamboree) want to dance, they can. If they can't or don't want to dance, they can just listen."

Mann becomes emotional when she thinks of the generosity shown by all those involved with the jamboree, both the entertainers and those who donate to the cause.

"It's wonderful," she said. "It makes you tear up to think that people take time out of their busy schedules to help in such a way."
