Police Evict Occupy-Omaha Protesters From Lot

OMAHA, Neb. (AP) — Police have arrested three people while evicting Occupy Omaha protesters from a parking lot near downtown.

The Omaha Police Department said officers made loudspeaker announcements around $\hat{4}$ a.m. Thursday to ensure the nine people on the property heard and had a chance to leave before being arrested for criminal trespass on city property.

Two of them immediately refused to leave.

A third person later sat in the middle of the lot and said he was staying.

Police say all three were cooperative as they were arrested and taken a few blocks away for booking into the county jail.

The Occupy Omaha group is part of the weeks-old Occupy movement that began in New York, decrying what protesters see as corporate greed and the growing gap between rich and poor.

Thieves Target Tricycles In Aberdeen

ABERDEEN (AP) — Thieves in Aberdeen are targeting threewheeled tricycles used by people with disabilities to get around town.

Two trikes disappeared in September and two in October, the latest last weekend. Two have been recovered, but with damage.

Nancy Schlichenmayer works with Aspire, an agency that provides services for the disabled. She says the thefts are troubling to the trikes' owners both emotionally and financially.

One owner has spent hundreds of dollars in taxi fares since her trike went missing.

A new trike can cost up to \$600. Police Capt. Neil Bittner says authorities are investigating the thefts.

Neb. State Trooper Fined For Running Red Light

MADISON, Neb. (AP) — A judge says a Nebraska state trooper must pay a \$75 fine for running a red light during a risky chase in his cruiser.

Trooper Matthew Parr was cited by Norfolk police in April 2010 after his cruiser collided with another vehicle at a Norfolk intersection

The Norfolk Daily News reports (http://bit.ly/vCQzgd) that troopers were chasing some motorcycles but called off the chase because of traffic.

Parr soon spotted a motorcycle run a stop sign. Parr gave chase but soon crashed.

Judge Ross Stoffer says the trooper would have been exempt from citation if he was otherwise operating his vehicle safely. But Stoffer says Parr didn't slow as necessary for the intersection and that the chase of a traffic violator didn't warrant unsafe operation of the cruiser.

Neb. AG Seeks Execution Date For Cult Leader

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - The Nebraska attorney general's office asked the state Supreme Court Thursday to schedule an execution date for former cult leader Michael Ryan, who was condemned for the torture and slaying of a man in 1985 at Ryan's compound near Rulo.

The request followed an announcement earlier in the day by the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services that it has obtained a new supply of one of three drugs needed to carry out executions by lethal injection.

Ryan's execution would be the first in Nebraska since 1997 and its first by lethal injection. The state had previously executed prisoners using the electric chair, but the Nebraska Supreme Court ruled in 2008 that it was cruel and unusual punishment.

Lawmakers voted in 2009 to replace the electric chair with lethal injection but earlier this year, the scheduled execution of another inmate, Carey Dean Moore, was put on hold following questions whether the state's supply of sodium thiopental, which was obtained from an India-based drug company, was purchased legally. Moore was sentenced to death for the 1979 slaying of two cabbies in Omaha.

The Nebraska Supreme Court issued a stay while Moore and his attorney challenged the state's purchase of sodium thiopental from the Indian company Kayem Pharmaceutical Pvt. Ltd. The company no longer sells sodium thiopental because of its use in executions.

The U.S. Drug Enforcement Agency had been investigating whether several states properly registered with federal regulators before importing the sedative, which is no longer made in the United States and is in scarce supply elsewhere. Stockpiles of the drug were seized from several states, including Georgia, Alabama, Kentucky, South Carolina and Tennessee. The DEA declined to say whether Nebraska's supply was under investigation.

On Thursday, the Nebraska Department of Correctional Services announced it had received a new supply of sodium thiopental from a Swiss pharmaceutical company and that the state can resume executions.

"With the receipt of this chemical, NDCS stands ready to fulfill its statutory obligation with regard to capital punishment," Director Robert Houston said in a statement.

The announcement also said the depart-

ment became licensed by the DEA to import the sedative.

In its request to the state Supreme Court, the Nebraska attorney general's office said no stays of execution have been issued by any federal court and that Ryan has no current litigation pending in federal courts.

'The state of Nebraska is presently prepared to conduct a constitutional execution and requests this court to order the enforcement of Ryan's sentence of death," the attorney general's office wrote in its request to the court.

Ryan was sentenced to die for the beating and slaving of James Thimm at Ryan's compound near Rulo, a town of about 200 people in the southeast corner of Nebraska.

Over three days, Thimm was beaten, sexually abused, shot, stomped and partially skinned while he was still alive. His fingertips had been shot off on one hand.

Ryan also was convicted in the beating death of a 5-year-old son of a cult member.

Corrections department spokeswoman Dawn-Renee Smith said there are currently 11 inmates on death row in Nebraska.

Dakotas Facing A Big Problem With Fuel Shortages

SIOUX FALLS (AP) - Fuel shortages that often occur during the busy fall harvest season in the Dakotas have reached levels not seen in years, industry officials say.

Gasoline and diesel shortages at fuel terminals throughout much of the Dakotas and into Minnesota have fuel truck drivers sitting in line for hours, waiting for fuel to arrive via pipeline. South Dakota Gov. Dennis Daugaard and North Dakota Gov. Jack Dalrymple both have relaxed service hour restrictions for commercial fuel truckers.

"This is worse than 2007-08," Dawna Leitzke, director of the South Dakota Petroleum Marketers Association, told the Argus Leader. "That was a supply nightmare. This is quickly escalating to a worse situation.

Four years ago, refinery outages were largely to blame for fall fuel shortages in the region. North Dakota Petroleum Marketers Association President Mike Rud said earlier this fall that a refinery maintenance shutdown in Montana was partly to blame for low supplies, but this year there also are other factors.

An early harvest in South Dakota put farmers into competition for diesel fuel with their counterparts in other states. There is a big demand from vehicles in the booming oil patch in western North Dakota, and work related to major flooding in the two states this year also has eaten into supplies.

Even in a normal year, South Dakota petroleum dealers will journey as far as Kansas and Oklahoma for gasoline and diesel to keep their customers supplied, Leitzke said. This year, the fuel is becoming even harder to find.

Dean Koch, energy division manager for Central Farmers Coop, drove by the huge Magellan Midstream Partners fuel depot in Sioux Falls this week. No deliveries are expected there before Monday.

"There wasn't a truck in the place," Koch said. "No gas. No diesel.

Spokesman Bruce Heine said pipeline companies are scrambling to keep up.

'This is not an issue of infrastructure that failed," he said. 'The demand has just been very high."

ily moved to Neshkoro, WI, where Myrtle worked as a teller at the Farmers Exchange Bank and served as Town Clerk for Crystal Lake Township. In the early 1970's they moved to Wautoma, WI where she got a job working at the County Nurse's office.
