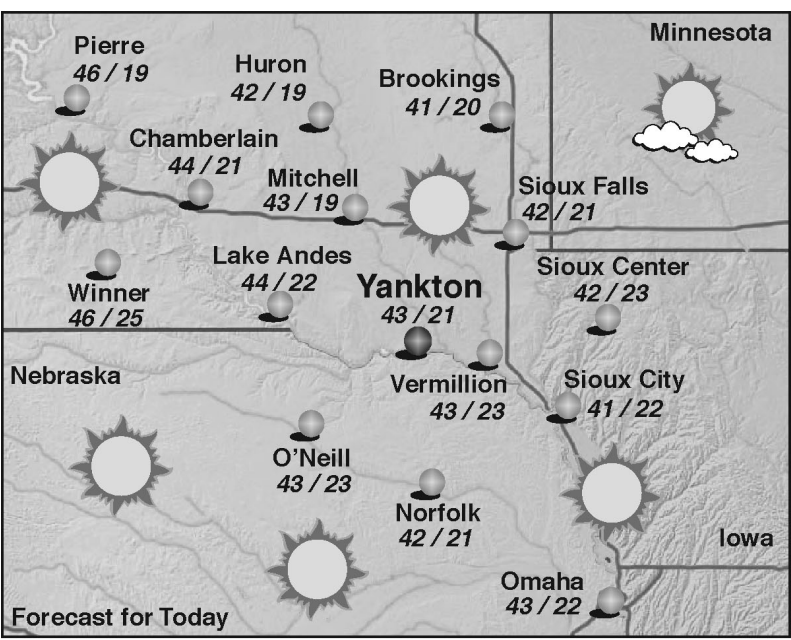

state's Public Service Commission, a five-member board elected from districts. Langemeier said giving power to the governor instead would allow him to require responses from state agencies.

"As the governor is trying to make this very important decision that affects the economic vitality of the state of Nebraska — the good life — he has the authority because these agencies fall under him to make them respond," Langemeier said.

The bill includes an emergency clause, so it would take effect immediately.

Heineman has said he wants a legal and constitutional solution to address the controversial Keystone XL route. The Republican governor has declined to comment since he announced the special session last month. Lawmakers have introduced five bills, three of which could lead to a pipeline rerouting.

Earlier in the day, Lincoln Sen. Bill Avery pitched his eminent do-

main pipeline bill to the Judiciary Committee. His measure, LB 3, would require pipeline developers to secure a state or federal permit before they can use eminent domain to take private land for construction.

Dave Domina, an Omaha attorney who represents pipeline opponents, said the bill would address a problem that Nebraska has failed to address.

"Nebraska has given the least and indeed no control over the delegation of eminent domain to oil pipeline companies, which is why you are in special session," he said. "Something needs to be done here, because here you have over-delegated."
