9AA: Wildkats Hope To Follow B-E-E's Blueprint For First-Year Success

A year ago, Bridgewater-Emery-Ethan was where Kimball-White Lake is now: A first-year co-op with a ton of talent and history between the joined programs, finding their way to the state finals. But the Seahawks are hoping to prevent the Wildkats from replicating their result, a state championship.

Bridgewater-Emery-Ethan looks to defend its Class 9AA title when the Seahawks face Kimball-White Lake at the DakotaDome in Vermillion tonight (Friday), the prime-time game in today's nineman football extravaganza. The Seahawks are in the second year of their current format, with Bridgewater joining Emery and Ethan after Bridgewater and Emery consolidated. Emery-Ethan had won three titles prior to the joining, while Bridgewater had won the state's first-ever championship game, the Class 9B title in 1981.

Kimball and White Lake have similar histories apart. Kimball claimed three titles in four years from 2001-04. White Lake, while co-oped with Plankinton, won titles in 1996 and 2002.

"They are a lot like us," said B-E-E head coach Jeff Van Leur, who mentored the Emery-Ethan success prior to the B-È-E co-op. "They've just gotten better every week.

KWL coach Dale Taylor said that the earlier successes for both program planted the seeds for the combined success.

"Some of these kids were grade school kids when those earlier titles were won," he said.

"That's where this all started, them believing that something good can happen. Both Kimball and White Lake have had success in the past, and I definitely think that has a lot to do with (ťhis

year's success).' Kimball-White Lake's success has been spurred by a pair of 1,000-yard rushers, Jacob Kirsch (1,077 yards, 13 TD) and Trevor Reinesch (1,042 yards, 12 TD). Quarterback Jesse Taylor has

just 209 yards rushing, but has thrown for 874 yards and 14 scores while executing the Wild-

kats' option offense. Kyle Peters has been the primary target, with 23 catches for 475 yards and four scores, but both Kirsch (12-158, 4 TD) and Reinesch (11-183, 5 TD) have also contributed with big catches. Coach Taylor also credits the Wildkats' solid front line with

opening up the field. "Our offensive line is leading the way," he said. "Willie Norwood, Donnie Beckmen, Philip Schroeder, Lucas Konechne ... they've all done a great job."

The Seahawk defense that will look to contain the Wildkats is led by Anthony Huber (120 tackles), Seth Wethor (105 tackles) and Ryan Hanks (89 tackles).

'We have some good kids up front, like Steven Whistler, Adrien Heiter, Seth Wethor, Terry Weber and Franky Tuscha," Van Leur said. "It's a team effort. They've pulled together, and don't care who gets the glory.'

Kendall LIndemann has been the Seahawks' main offensive weapon, rushing for 1,742 yards and 26 touchdowns. Huber is also over the 1,000-yard mark, with 1,269 yards and 15 touchdowns. QB Jace Connor, though not called on often to use his arm, has been effective, completing 30 of 37 passes for 292 yards and five scores. Wethor (12-100) and Ryan Hanks (11-115) have been primary targets.

The offensive line's growth during the season has allowed the typically-grounded Seahawks offense to move down the field effectively.

"Our line play has been big. We were young there and needed some seasoning," Van Leur said. "We have a bunch of kids there that have made the most of their opportunity.'

As they are on offense for K-WL, Reinesch (87 tackles, 3 INT) and Kirsch (80 tackles, 1 sack, 1 INT) are among the leaders of the Wildkat defense. Jess Taylor shares the team lead with three
