When Fuel Pumps Go Bad

I live in Houston, and on a typical 104-degree day this past summer, I took my son's car to run some errands and stopped first to fill the tank. I then drove to my first stop, about 15 minutes away, and went in to shop. I was there about an hour. I came out, started the car and it rattled and died. I tried starting it multiple times, but it just didn't seem like it was getting any fuel. I walked over to a nearby auto-repair chain, told them my story and the guy asked me if my tank was empty when I stopped for gas. Well, it is my son's car, so of course it was empty! He immediately said that I had cracked the fuel pump by putting cold gasoline into a hot gas tank. Well, \$650 later, the car is running again, but everyone I have told this to says I was scammed. Was he telling me the truth, or just shining me on? — Hart`

RAY: Wait a second, Hart. I'm writing down this story. I may be able to make a few boat payments with this "cracked fuel pump"

TOM: We've never heard of a cracked fuel pump, Hart. The housing of the fuel pump is metal. So I find it hard to believe that it would crack if it came into contact with 50-degree gasoline.

RAY: Maybe he meant that the plastic impeller cracked — that's the internal part of the pump that actually pushes the fuel. Even then, I've never seen that happen due to "cold" gasoline. It just happens due to age

TOM: But assuming they tested your fuel pump and it was dead, and that replacing the fuel pump has solved the problem, I'd have to conclude that this guy was right. At least his diagnosis was correct, even though his explanation was nutty.

RAY: I assume that since this is your son's car, and he always has the tank on E, it's not

exactly a brand-new model. On a highmileage, older car, anything can go wrong at any time. I think the fuel pump just happened

to die that day. **TOM:** But not because you filled up the tank. If fuel pumps regularly cracked when gas was added on hot days, what would peo-ple in Houston do all summer? Push their

cars around until things cooled off in the fall? **RAY:** Seems unlikely. But fuel pumps do fail. And if you are satisfied that they actually did replace your fuel pump for the \$650, and that fixed it, I think the timing of the fuel pump's demise was just a coincidence. So feel free to get gas next summer.

South Dakota DMV Implementing Changes

PIERRE — The Division of Motor Vehicles in the South Dakota Department of Revenue is implementing changes as part of Gov. Dennis Daugaard's Better Government Initiative to cut red tape, make state government more efficient and open, and bolster online e-government.

The division has identified two areas where better use of technology will provide increased efficiency and the potential for significant cost

First, the division is offering an option to vehicle owners to get their motor vehicle registration renewal reminders by email instead of the postcards currently sent by regular mail.

"Mailed notices played a major part in the implementation of the online renewal system, but email notices will save money," said Motor Vehicles Division Director Deb Hillmer. "Vehicle owners can select their reminder preference, either email notification or a mailed postcard, and they can even opt out of the notification process entirely if they want."

Hillmer indicates vehicle owners wanting to change their notification preference can do so online through the "Remind Me" icon at http://sd-

motor vehicle title is being mailed to the lien-

Previously, when a title was mailed to the lien-



holder of record, a second mailing of the lienholder notice of filing was also mailed to the lienholder. The result was two separate envelopes being mailed to the same location.

"Éarly in September, Gov. Daugaard forwarded to me a suggestion received from a constituent,' Hillmer said. "The writer logically pointed out the savings to the State in both postage and supplies if the motor vehicle title and the notice are mailed together."
While that solution was reviewed by the divi-

sion in the past, Hillmer points out that it would have required changing an automated process to a manual process. That would have been neither efficient nor cost-effective.

Hillmer took the constituent suggestion one step further and entirely eliminated mailing of the lienholder notice of filing. The lien-release information and form provided on the lienholder notice of filing is available on the division website's forms section at http://www.state.sd.us/drr2/motorvehicle/forms.htm.

'The form can be completed online and printed for the necessary signatures and is available 24/7," continued Hillmer. "Anyone who does not have Internet access can either obtain the form from the county treasurer's office or call us and we'll be happy to mail it out.' As both changes are put in place, Hillmer ex-

pects a cumulative savings in excess of \$100,000 annually. The actual amount is dependent on the number of motor vehicle owners electing to receive renewal reminders by email, she said.

Division personnel will continue to review daily operations to identify other areas where efficiencies and cost-savings can be introduced,
