Rivals Square Off With GWC Title At Stake

VERMILLION — It all comes down to this. Two rivals, both ranked. Final

game of the season. Conference championship up for grabs.

There are plenty of story lines sur-rounding today's (Saturday) Great West Conference football game between No. 24-ranked South Dakota and No. 22 North Dakota, at the Alerus Center in Grand Forks, N.D.

For the Coyotes (6-4, 2-1), the mag-nitude has made this game one of the most anticipated in recent memory.

"You couldn't really write a better script, could you?," senior receiver Dusty Nowotny said this week. "We've never won up there in their place and we haven't won a Great West championship.

"It's a great story line for us."

■ Today's game will be broadcast on radio stations 1450 AM and 102.7 FM. The game will also be televised by Midco Sports, cable channel 21.

The winner of today's 1 p.m. showdown clinches a share of the Great West crown, with Cal Poly. Making that accomplishment even more significant is that today could also mark the final football game in the series, as North Dakota bolts for the Big Sky Conference next fall and USD leaves for the Missouri Valley Football Conference.

Yet for the 23 seniors on the USD side, it could be a fitting end to careers spent in the Division I transition period

"We're pretty amped up, especially all of us seniors because it's our last football game ever," Potter said. "We couldn't ask for anything more.'

With the exception of a conference title. And for these two teams, getting to this point is saying something.

USD finished 4-7 last year, with its only league win coming against the Sioux, while North Dakota was 3-8 a

year ago. "This really is something," UND coach Chris Mussman said this week. "It says a lot about both programs that we have improved and are in position to be playing for a share of a Great West title.'

What hasn't improved is USD's record in games in Grand Forks.

The Coyotes have not won a road game against North Dakota since 1985, a string of 11 straight games (Or put another way, before the current

seniors for USD were born).

On the subject of the road record, USD coach Ed Meierkort joked briefly that maybe a change in routine would do the Coyotes some good.

"We might walk to the game this year just to change it up," Meierkort said. "It's time for this team to win this game. You get tired of hearing about it.'

That record is something the players are aware of, but there's only loss they had control of, Nowotny said.

"It's only been one loss for us there, so it's not really as big of a deal for us," said Nowotny, who has caught 26 passes this season for 291 yards and four touchdowns. "We're looking at that we have never beaten them in the Alerus Center. "That's what we want to do."

In all, North Dakota has won 13 of

Hegge Propels USD To Season-Opening Win Over No. Arizona

VERMILLION — The South Dakota women's basketball team was one of the last teams in the nation to open its season, yet the Coyotes came out in mid-season form.

The Northern Arizona Lumberjacks visited Vermillion for only the second meeting ever between the teams. The Lumberjacks came in with a 2-1 record as well as an exhibition victory, and last year's Big Sky leading scorer, Amy Patton.

Despite facing a team with more experience in the young season, South Dakota jumped on the Lumberjacks early and often, recording a 73-56 victory Friday night at the DakotaDome in Vermillion.

The Coyotes scored on each of their first three possessions, while holding NAU to only two points. A minute and thirty seconds into the game, USD was ahead 8-2.

'We were anxious to get going," senior guard Annie Roche said. "We were the last women's team to open up their season."

The offensive explosion continued for the Yotes before the first timeout of the game. USD was ahead 15-6 with 15 minutes left in the first half. In this stretch the Coyotes were 3-3 from the three point line, and preseason Summit League second team All-Conference selection Amber Hegge had nine of those 15 points.

"We were excited to start our year," said the Crofton, Neb., native, who scored 30 points in the game. "We finally got to play on our new court and shoot on the new court.'

And shooting was exactly what Hegge and the Coyotes did. USD ended the game 10-18 from the three point line for 56 percent, and ended the game at 53 percent from the field.

The whole game was not a breeze though. After the hot start by the Yotes, Northern Arizona made their way back into the game. At halftime USD held a nine point lead in a fast paced half, 43-34.

SIOUX FALLS — Northwestern's Jussy Tuscherer and Ashley Clemens combined for 44 kills to power the Wildcats to a 25-18, 25-17, 27-25 victory over Parker in the semifinals of the South Dakota State Class B Volleyball Tournament, Friday at Sioux Falls Arena.

Parker led a back-and-forth opening set 16-14 when Northwestern got rolling. Řiding the hot hand of Tuscherer, the Wildcats ended the set on an 11-2 run, including five kills from the senior.

"I tell our setter to go with the hot hitter until it isn't working anymore," said Northwestern head coach Nora Groft. "When it's working, you go with it."

The second set followed a similar track. Parker led 12-11 before a 6-0 run — including five Tuscherer kills — put the Wildcats in control.

We lost our composure in sets one and two," said Parker head coach Jill Christensen. "We haven't seen that much all year."

In the third set, Parker jumped out to a 7-2 lead and stayed in the game. Trailing 22-20, Northwestern got three straight kills from Clemens to take a 23-22 lead.
