

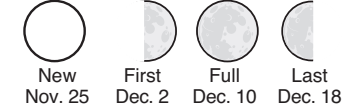

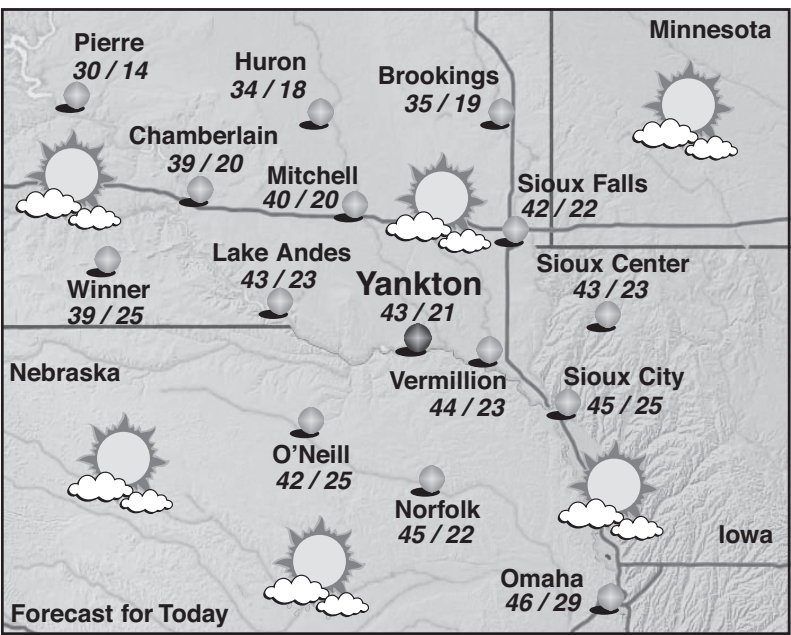

ST. LOUIS (AP) — Augustana College's women's cross country team captured the Division II title at the NCAA Championships in Spokane, Wash. The *Argus Leader* reports that the women totaled 75 points in the 6,000-meter course, four points better than runner up Western State College of Colorado. The Vikings were ranked fourth in the nation going into Saturday's meet. This is the second national championship title for Augustana College. The Vikings softball team won a championship title in 1991. The men's cross country team placed sixth in their 10,000-meter course. The Augustana cross country programs have made a combined 22 appearances at the NCAA Championships.

Deadline Near For Overseas Holiday Mailings

WASHINGTON — Sen. Tim Johnson (D-S.D.) is urging South Dakotans interested in sending packages to servicemembers in the Middle East in time for the holidays to do so via First Class or Priority Mail by Dec. 3. Packages to other military locations outside of the Middle East should be sent by Dec. 10. "There are many servicemembers who are going to spend the holidays away from their families and it is important to help them feel connected when they are so far away," Johnson said. "Please keep the members of our military who are overseas in your thoughts and prayers and if you are interested in sending packages, do so before the Dec. 3 and Dec. 10 deadlines." Smaller packages about the size of a shoebox that weigh less than 20 pounds are recommended. All packages should include the soldier's name, the organization to which they are assigned and their unit number. Department of Defense requirements mandate that mail be sent to specific servicemembers, though organizations are in place that would deliver non-specific "Any Servicemember" packages. Operation USO provides a soldier with often requested items, including pre-paid worldwide phone cards, sunscreen, and toiletries, along with a personalized message from the donor. Sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Operation Uplink also provides soldiers with phone cards, and Gifts from the Homefront has gift certificates available that soldiers can redeem at military exchanges.

opposition to the newest U.S. dance fad, the "twist." He told his colleagues in the Alabama Chiropractic Assn. the "twist" is both immoral and bad for the vertebrae. After reading the Associated Press report of his remarks, one might suspect the doctor has unspoken objections to the dance. In his spare time Dr. Plimpton operates a dance school. Whether or not the "twist" is any more injurious to public morals than any other dance - the rumba, for example - surely is a debatable point. We'll bet TV watching has put more cricks in U.S. spines than the "twist" ever will.

Panel

The panel's failure also sets up a fight within a battle-weary, dysfunctional Congress over renewing a payroll tax cut and jobless benefits for the long-term unemployed, both of which are set to expire at the end of the year. Both proposals are part of President Barack Obama's \$447 billion jobs plan. Extending the current 2 percentage point payroll tax cut isn't a popular idea with many Republicans, but allowing it to expire

what we believe or stopping helping people who need help. We think that is an unfortunate choice to be put in, so we're going to work to educate lawmakers, government officials and others about how important the social outreach of the Catholic Church is and that it ought not be compromised because someone might not agree with everything we believe in." Church leaders have talked publicly about some areas where they feel their religious liberties are being violated. They are asking the Obama administration for more exemptions in the new health care law because it would require Catholic hospitals

also planning to donate approximately \$42,000 to area organizations. It's part of an ongoing effort of the One Mind, One Heart, One Spirit ... in Christ Capital Campaign to give 5 percent of the approximately \$3.7 million pledged to those in need. The campaign was formed to raise money for the Sacred Heart expansion. "I think people are very proud that we're reaching out to the poor," Fr. Lichter said. "We started raising money in a very down economy, and it was a way to respond to people's suffering at that time. In the midst of this big campaign and building project, we're still trying to be very mindful of those in need. We're

could harm the economy, economists say. So too would a cutoff of unemployment benefits averaging about \$300 a week to millions of people who have been out of work for more than six months. Serious negotiations ended Friday after Democrats rejected a \$644 billion offer comprised of \$543 billion in spending cuts, fees and other non-tax revenue, as well as \$3 billion in tax revenue from closing a special tax break for corporate purchases of private jets. It also assumed \$98 billion in reduced interest costs. Officials familiar with the offer said it would save the government \$121 billion by requiring federal civilian workers to con-

tribute more to their pension plans, shave \$23 billion from farm and nutrition programs and generate \$15 billion from new auctions of broadcast spectrum to wireless companies. Democrats said the plan was unbalanced because it included barely any tax revenue. "Our Democratic friends are unable to cut even a dollar in spending without saying it has to be accompanied by tax increases," Kyl said. On Saturday, Sen. Rob Portman floated an even smaller plan, said a lawmaker directly familiar with the panel's work. It, too, was rejected. The lawmaker required anonymity because of the secrecy of the talks.

and universities to have insurance that would cover birth control for most of their employees. Bishop William E. Lori, who serves as the chairman of the committee on religious liberty, cited cases where Catholic agencies no longer receive state funding for adoption and foster care services because they would be required to work with same-sex couples. "The services which the Catholic Church and other denominations provide are more crucial than ever, but it is becoming more and more difficult for us to deliver these services in a manner that respects the very faith that impels us to provide them," Lori said during a speech at the conference. Swain said Sunday that the real issue is not individual topics like contraception or allowing same-sex couples to adopt, but rather allowing Catholics the freedom to exercise their beliefs.

charity and voluntary action are not sufficient. We also carry out our moral responsibility to assist and empower the poor by working collectively through government to establish just and effective public policies." They also wrote about how work is necessary for human dignity and social justice and emphasized full employment. Swain said that the current national unemployment rate of 9 percent is unacceptable and acknowledged that food pantries and nutrition programs are being taxed by the huge demand for their services. He said the bishops will be revisiting the subject of economic justice in the future. "It all centers around our core belief in the respect for every human person from conception to the end of life," Swain said.

That will bring the total donations to area organizations so far to about \$107,000. "That's a great testimony to who we are as Catholics," Swain said. "When we give to organizations like that, we don't say you have to be a Catholic or agree with everything we do, but we care about you as a person who has been gifted by God with life."
