



With nearly 1,000 Facebook friends, Carolyn finds herself “talking” to people in South Africa, Italy, the Philippines and beyond. She often finds her own faith is deepened and renewed through the interaction.

“One thing about Facebook that I love is that, within moments after posting a prayer request you see response after response of prayers and encouragement,” Carolyn notes. “There’s something about knowing people all over the world are praying for you. It’s very powerful. Prayer is very powerful.”

Both Carolyn and Bob have relied on prayer to bring them to their present level of ministry.

The roots of Carolyn’s ministry go back to her speaking engagements through Stonecroft, a women’s ministry located in Missouri. For a number of years Carolyn has shared her personal faith journey with Stonecroft women’s groups throughout South Dakota, Nebraska, Minnesota and Iowa. For nearly 27 years she has directed church choirs as a ministry in music.

Bob says his ministry journey began in 1995 when he realized he could trust God to guide him through life’s struggles.

“From that point on I found a variety of ways to grow my faith,” Bob says. “Carolyn has had a very strong influence on me in that growth. She encouraged me to become involved with groups like Promise Keepers and to keep searching for ways to mature and develop my faith.”

In 2004, when he traveled to Bismarck, N.D., to attend a church conference as a lay person, Bob felt a tug to move even deeper into ministry. At the time, he wasn’t certain what that meant.

“At a service I attended during the conference, the bishop invited anyone there with an interest in becoming more involved in ministry to come forward and receive prayer,” Bob remembers. “I felt God just pulling me out of the pew, telling me I needed to go forward, so I did.”

It wasn’t until 2009 that his local church created a pastoral assistant position, that Bob began solidifying plans to move to a new level of ministry.

“I was very interested in that assistant position, even though I wasn’t necessarily ready to retire from my job here with the Yankton Chamber,” Bob says. “I decided to apply for the job and I was blessed to be offered the position. At that point, I felt it was time for me to go just a little further with my ministry. That led me to begin a candidacy program to become a licensed local pastor.”

When Bob completed his studies and was recognized as a licensed local pastor, his church upgraded his position there to associate pastor. In that capacity he now assists with various ministry duties, including visitations, assisting the senior pastor, the Rev. Ron Johnson, and doing what he can to help church members in their own spiritual journey.

“The United Methodist Church usually appoints ministers to serve in a church,” Bob says. “It’s not the norm for someone to be assigned a ministry position in their home church. However, it was a blessing to me that our bishop determined that this was an appropriate assignment for me. The work is so rewarding for me. I don’t have many of the pressures a senior pastor would experience, but I don’t feel the stress and struggle in this position that I’ve felt in past jobs. It just seems like a very natural fit.”

Among the work that Bob and Carolyn do — together or on their own — is helping others understand the meaning of God’s word. Both believe that’s a critical component of spiritual growth.

“A lot of times people read the Bible but don’t really understand what’s being said,” Bob explains. “We hear a lot about the Good News of Jesus Christ. But what does that really mean? We have some very knowledgeable folks in our church who conduct Bible studies to help people understand and build their faith. We believe that’s so important to our faith life.”

“Carolyn and I also believe everyone has opportunities to minister in their daily life,” Bob adds. “Sometimes people aren’t certain what their ministry gifts are, but we all have them. You don’t have to go to the level that Carolyn and I have in order to do that. You might be doing something within your church or something outside it. Taking the initiative to help others find God’s guidance and direction is ministry. We just need to let God lead us in that and allow our natural gifts to be used.”
