# **Bodies Could Bring Craigslist Toll To 3**

Associated Press COLUMBUS, Ohio — The discoveries of two new bodies could bring to three the death toll from a Craigslist ad that

police say lured victims into a lethal robbery scheme. A body found Friday in a shallow grave near a mall in Akron may be that of a missing man who answered the ad, the FBI said. And a sheriff in a rural county said later in the day that the

body of a white male without identification was found in a shallow grave about 90 miles away. The FBI is working on the supposition that the body found near the Rolling Acres shopping mall in Akron may be that of 47-year-old Timothy Kern, who hasn't been seen in more than a week, agency spokeswoman Vicki

Anderson said. "Do we think it might be? Maybe," Anderson said. "He's missing. We haven't been able to find him. It could possibly be, but we just don't know that

Anderson declined to specify how

authorities discovered the body.

Kern, of Massillon, answered the same ad for a farm hand that authorities say led to the shooting death of Norfolk, Va., resident David Pauley, 51, in a rural area of Nobel County 90 miles south of Akron. A South Carolina man reported answering the ad and being shot Nov. 6 but escaping.

Noble County Sheriff Steve Hannum is under a judge's gag order and can't comment on the case, but the title of his emailed announcement late Friday -"second body" — implied the discovery was connected with Pauley's death.

Neighbors where Pauley's body was found last week and the second body was found Friday said police had been in the area and a helicopter had been overhead most of the day but the scene

was quiet late in the day.

Two people from the Akron area are in custody: a high school student who has been charged with attempted murder and 52-year-old Richard Beasley, who is in jail on unrelated charges.

Beasley's mother has said he has "a very caring heart" and she prays that newspaper reports he is a suspect are

FBI agents have contacted people to check on their well-being, FBI spokesman Harry Trombitas said Friday

in an email. One was Heather Tuttle, of Ravenna, who applied for the job Oct. 7 but never got a response. She had forgotten about the posting until an FBI agent called and

left a message for her Monday. When she called back, she was stunned at what the agent told her.

"It could have been me," said Tuttle, 27, who has since taken work as an assistant manager at a gas station.

"When the situation was explained to me, it just instantly made me sick and made me realize how lucky I am that I didn't get a response back," she said. Another man who responded to the

ad has said he met Beasley at a food court at a different mall in the Akron area on Oct. 10. Ron Sanson, of Stow. was told the man was looking for an older, single or divorced person to watch over a 688-acre farm in southeast Ohio — the kind of man, Sanson said, whose disappearance might not be quickly noticed.

Sanson and Kern are both divorced. So was Pauley.

with the ornaments so they get the recognition as well."

Halsey chose to design her ornament to be inside the 5.5-inch-in-diameter, clear plastic globes.

"They need 24 ornaments from each state," she explained. "Of the 24 ornaments, 23 will be hung on the state/territory Christmas tree as part of the National Christmas Tree display, and one will be hung on a Christmas tree in the U.S. Capitol Visitor Center showcasing each state/territory ornament."

She also said that her design was influenced by her trip to Kadoka to work with the students. Halsey and the Kadoka students will be recognized on a sign that is placed directly beside the state/territory Christmas tree, in addition to recognition in the official event souvenir program and online.

"I was headed to Kadoka because they wanted an artist to work with their kids." Halsey said. "I had four hours driving time to Kadoka to figure out my design, so I got inspired by the road, I guess. I do want people to get the sense of peace when they look at it. I was thinking peaceful, wind blowing, wintertime. Other than that, when you are trying to represent South Dakota, you think of such traditional things that I really didn't want to do. I was shooting for the feeling of the plains, the simplicity.'

While this is the first time Halsey will have a Christmas ornament on display, it isn't the first time she has been asked to participate in a national program like this.

"I had an Easter egg when George and Laura Bush were in the White House that was displayed as well," she said. "Then it went to the Bush's Library."

She has also sent items to President Richard Nixon and to former

Sen. Tom Daschle.

"In high school, I sent a Christmas card I made to Nixon and got a Christmas card back from him," she said. "I sent a mask to Tom Daschle once because I was disgruntled with politics. I sent him a mask of what I considered to be the worst politician with a note in its teeth. He wrote me back and said, 'This is FOR me, not of me, right?' He said he would keep it on his wall to keep his ego in check. He also wanted to know if it was a traveling trophy.
"I have always had a need to say

something, so it is nice to be involved in such a positive note.

Halsey said if people in the community wish to see the ornament, she believes it will be available for viewing online at www.thenationaltree.org. She also said she currently has jewelry she designed on display at the G.A.R. Hall Gallery as part of the Yankton Area Art's Crimson Door Show and will be doing a personal show of her designs at the hall next spring.

Service, says Americans are on track to spend \$488 billion on gas this year. That will eclipse the record set in 2008 by \$40 billion. OPIS said last week that U.S. households have spent 8.4 percent of their income on gasoline this year, up from 6.7 percent in 2010 and 7.9 percent in 2008.

That may be one reason that malls are bustling this year with shoppers looking marked down cashmere sweaters,

videogame consoles, tablet computers and flat-screen televisions. Kloza estimates that, at current demand, for every 10 cent decline in the price of gas, Americans save a total of \$36 million to spend elsewhere. Retailers hope shoppers reinvest at least part of their recent savings in gifts for friends and family. Kloza says current demand for gas in the

U.S. remains "extraordinarily poor." That's the main reason why gas prices are dropping even though oil has risen about \$17 a barrel, or 21 percent, in the last two months.

Oil rose Friday, but was down slightly for the week. The benchmark for crude oil in the U.S. rose 60 cents to \$96.77. It dropped \$1.84 on Wednesday, before markets in the U.S. were closed for the Thanksgiving

In London, Brent crude for January delivery fell \$1.54 to \$105.76 a barrel on the ICE Futures exchange.

In other Nymex trading, heating oil dropped 3.1 cents to \$2.94 per gallon and gasoline futures lost 6.63 cents to \$2.4542 per gallon. Natural gas added 5.7 cents to \$3.665 per 1,000 cubic feet.

The national average for gasoline peaked just below \$4 a gallon in May. Kloza says there are now 23 states where drivers can find gas below \$3 per gallon. He cautions drivers to enjoy the relatively cheap prices while they can.

Gas prices tend to bottom out in midwinter, and then begin to climb through the spring. By Kloza's calculations, if prices bottom out at \$3.10 to \$3.20 a gallon then, based on historical trends, drivers could see gas ranging from \$3.75 to as high as \$4.50 in the spring.
