

SHS Soup Luncheon Serves The Needy

Sacred Heart School (SHS) administration, teachers, staff and students served hot soup to many on Tuesday, Oct. 23, to fund rice packets for serving others in the future!

The SHS Soup Luncheon helps feed the hungry, much like the Bible passage of Matthew 14:17. When the people reported to Jesus that there were only five loaves and two fish to feed the crowd, the Lord provided food for all and they were satisfied.

This week, Yankton celebrated Character Counts Week, promoting the six pillars of: Trustworthiness, Respect, Responsibility, Caring and Citizenship. The SHS Soup Luncheon brings greater awareness for SHS' commitment to Character Counts. In the spirit of Character Counts, SHS wanted to Make A Difference. SHS middle school students helped at the luncheon but their goal was selfless service.

SHS Principal Regan Manning reported that all SHS Soup Luncheon proceeds benefit the Kids Against Hunger program.

Nearly 375 people attended, providing free will donations. Those contributions will help to make almost an equal number of dry bags of fortified rice and soy casserole. The students did the math to calculate that each bag costs only 23 cents, but will provide six servings when it is shipped to the hungry in Haiti.

The students look forward to a future date when they will be purchasing ingredients and preparing the rice meals bags that provide complete nutrition with nine essential amino acids.

The SHS Soup Luncheon served a delicious meal of chili, chicken noodle soup, hotdogs and vegetables. An added treat was dessert of ice cream and delicious home baked cookies. Under the supervision of Sr. Margo Tschetter and Mrs. Barb Geigle, the fifth grade classes contributed to the fundraiser by baking more than 800 delicious chocolate chip and gingersnap cookies for the luncheon.

Sister Margo stated, "This Soup Luncheon offers a good reminder for our students as to how blessed we are. It also helps us realize that many others are not as blessed. The students see how we have a chance, through our service, to change others' lives and make our world a better place."

Disabilities Employment Awareness Awards Presented

The Yankton City Commission has proclaimed October as Disability Employment Awareness Month (DEAM). Yankton has joined disability awareness efforts across America as Public Law 176 guarantees an annual proclamation by the President of the United States designating October as National Disability Employment Awareness Month.

Disability employment awareness training was held in Yankton on Oct. 9, and the city commission designated that date as Disability Awareness Day locally. The training also included an opportunity to applaud all employers and employees who support individuals with disabilities in the workplace, reported rehabilitation counselor Jennifer Trenhaile, who served as the Yankton DEAM committee chairperson.

Mayor Nancy Wenande thanked those who provide support for skill development to enhance employability of people with disabilities. She also complimented those with disabilities who strive to overcome or compensate for any limitations in the workplace.

Wenande presented the 2012 Yankton DEAM Employee of the Year Award to Jim Johnson, who works for A'viands, the contractual food service for Yankton-based state residential facilities. Originally from the Watertown area, Johnson has lived in Yankton for 15 years. He earned the award for being conscientious, reliable, hard-working and compassionate when serving patients.

Mayor Wenande also praised local agencies that employ those with disabilities in Yankton. She extended special appreciation to Days Inn, presenting them with the 2012 Yankton DEAM Employer of the Year Award. Days Inn exemplifies the program's 2012 theme, which is "A Strong Workforce is an Inclusive Workforce: What Can YOU DO?" For years Days Inn has consistently highlighted the skills and promoted the employment of those with disabilities. It also allows workers an opportunity to demonstrate their abilities and promotes inclusion for all workers. Days Inn is recognized as a great example of a local business
