turnout in election years, but we also average a higher turnout than the state, so we could see even higher numbers.
In southeast South Dakota, early balloting remains steady.
However, a lack of local races in Bon Homme County may be holding down voter turnout in that county, said Auditor Tammy Brunken.
"We have the two legislative races but no county races," she said. "So far, we have about 400 absentee ballots out of 3,971 registered voters, so that's about 10 percent. That's what we usually get for a presidential election. Back in 2008, we had just short of 500 absentee ballots."
Bon Homme County voters may show special interest in the U.S. House race between Republican incumbent Kristi Noem and Democratic challenger Matt Varilek, Brunken said.
"I'm thinking, with Matt coming from this part of the state, from Bon Homme and Yankton counties, that it might bring more people out (to the polls)," the auditor said.
Tuesday marks the first general election with Bon Homme County split into two legislative districts under redistricting. For Brunken, it means more work with additional sets of ballots.
When first proposed, the split drew strong opposition in Bon Homme County. Residents feared the division would dilute the county's voice in the Legislature and result in elected legislators from distant areas who were unaware or unconcerned with Bon Homme County issues.
With the split now a reality, voters are handling the change well, Brunken said. "People don't have a problem knowing their legislative district when it comes to the election," she said.
For Clay County Auditor Ruth Bremer, Tuesday's election represents a swan song as she will retire after eight years as auditor. However, she may not be finished with county government, as she is running for an at-large seat as Clay County commissioner.
Bremer said she will step down as auditor to move away from the daily demands of the office and have more time for personal reasons. However, she still wanted to

remain involved with county government and could do so as a part-time commissioner.
With Bremer's candidacy, the auditor's staff has handled the daily hand-on work surrounding the election to avoid a conflict of interest.
So far, Clay County has seen strong early balloting, Bremer said. "We are so swamped that we haven't had time to think," she said. "We have 1,467 early ballots so far, and we are looking at 2,000 by Tuesday out of about 8,000 eligible voters."

The only county-level race is for District 2 county commissioner for a four-year term between Republican Jerry Wiese and write-in candidate Craig Bartels. No Democrats filed for the race.
The following are local races, which could see write-in candidates.
• BELDEN: No filings for the two four-year terms on the village board.
• COLERIDGE: In the school board race, Marlin Papenhausen and Robert Colwell are running for the three four-year terms. In the town race, Mary Jo Hansen and Kerry Hefner are running for the three four-year terms on the village board.
• FORDYCE: Daniel Thoene and Thomas Pinkelman are running for the two four-year terms on the village board.
• HARTINGTON: In the school board race, Doug Miller, Ron Pearson, Gerri A. Jueden and V.E. Rossiter Jr. are running for three four-year terms. In City Council races, Tim Burbach is running for the open four-year term from the North Ward, while Deb Addison and Joe Hish are running for the one four-year term in the South Ward. Bud Becker and Darrell Kathol are running for the two six-year terms on the airport authority.
• LAUREL: In the school board race, Richard Brandon, Garry A. Anderson, Jay Hall, Ryan Van Cleave and Bruce Haisch are running for the three four-year terms. In the City Council race, Mark Patfield is running for the four-year term as mayor. Logan Garber is running for the four-year term in the East Ward, while Verneal Gade and Jerry Wiemers are running for the one four-year term from the West Ward.
• MAGNET: Darlene Lackas and Jason Becker are the two candidates for the three four-year terms.
• NEWCASTLE: Cedar County voters in the Newcastle school district have Alan Kneiff and Nancy McCluskey running for the three four-year terms on the Newcastle

school board.
• RANDOLPH: In the school board race, Michael L.H. Strathman, Timothy W. Kint and Jim Scott are running for the three four-year terms. Brad Bargstadt and Chad Winkelbauer are running for the two vacant four-year seats as at-large members of the City Council.
• ST. HELENA: Victor Paltz is the lone candidate for the two four-year terms on the
• WYNOT: In the school board race, Dean Heine, Dan Wieseler and Alison Lange are running for the three four-year terms. In the town race, John Eskins Jr., Ron Rolfe and Charles T. Jones are running for the three four-year terms on the village board.
KNOX COUNTY
The only county-level race comes in District 6 contest (Wausa, Neb., area) for a Board of Supervisors seat between Republican Steven Banks and Democrat Danny Schlote.
The following are local races, which could see write-in candidates.
• BAZILE MILLS: Richard Stubben and Lawrence Vortherms are running for two vacant seats on the village board of trustees.
• BLOOMFIELD: Running for the three school board seats are Christy Mackepang, Jason Hefner and Brian Eisenhauer. The City Council has two openings, with Steven Barney running as the lone candidate. The two seats on the airport authority are sought by Joe Kauth, Steven Barney and Scott Ober.
• CENTER: Susan Wiebelhaus and Tricia Smith are running for the two vacant seats on the village board of trustees.
• CREIGHTON: Running for the three school board seats are Daniel Morrill, Erik Burns, Greg Wortman, Stacy Homan, Gene Suhr and Jody Fuchtmann. The City Council has two openings, with Robert Jensen as the lone candidate. The airport authority has two vacancies sought by Robert Borgmann and Milan Jensen.
• CROFTON: Running for the three school board seats are Kevin Kube, Clair Arens and Ed Kleinschmit. The City Council has two vacancies sought by Tom Allen, Jason Wavrunek and Chad Reifenthal.
• NIOBRARA: Running for the three school board seats are Stuart Redwing, Brian Stark and Cindy

Sage. Running for the three open seats on the village board of trustees are Susan Bolling, Sheila Keeler and Stanley Dryak.
• SANTEE: Running for the three school board seats are Tammy Sandoval, Susan Kitto, Clarissa LaPlante, Sidney Tuttle and Cindy Whipple. Running for the three vacant spots on the village board of trustees are Donald LaPointe Sr., Susan Kitto and Kimberly Red Wing.
• VERDEL: Edward Kee and Jim Johnston are running for the two vacant spots on the village board of trustees.
• VERDIGRE: Residents will decide whether to increase the current 1 percent city sales tax to 1 1/2 percent.
Running for the three four-year terms on the school board are Marty Konopasek, Duane Liska, David Pierce and Lance Knigge. Running for the one two-year seat on the school board are Mike Hrbek and Travis Sucha. Running for the three open seats on the village board of trustees are Joan Vakoc and Delores Ruzicka.
• WAUSA: Running for the three four-year terms on the school board are Terry Nelson, Terry Johnson, Darren Vanness and Kristal Thorell. Running for the one two-year term on the school board is Chad Vanness. Running for the two four-year terms on the village board of trustees are Ron Nelson and Patrick Clausen.
• WINNETOON: Running for the two four-year terms on the village board of trustees are Steve Harley and Linda Kallhoff.
Polls are open from 7 a.m.-7 p.m. (local time) in South Dakota and from 8 a.m.-8 p.m. (CST) in Nebraska. Election results can be released immediately after polls close in Nebraska. In South Dakota, the secretary of state's office and statewide media outlets must wait until polls close in the Mountain time zone.
