Three suspects in the case — one of whom is believed to have been the getaway driver — were located along Whiting Drive near Alumax Road in Yankton, according to Lt. Todd Brandt of the Yankton Police Department.

"We were advised by Sioux Falls authorities to check a residence in Yankton," he said. "Upon investigation, the suspects were found during a traffic stop in a residential area in Yankton."

They were arrested without incident.

According to Public Information Officer Sam Clemens of the Sioux Falls Police Department, a call from

a citizen led authorities to believe the suspects could be traced back to Yankton.

"The whole part of this being solved hinged on the information that we were provided," he said. "From time to time, we get really good information from citizens, and this is one of those cases."

The three men were also arrested on charges of possessing/receiving stolen property.

Additionally, Koller was charged with false impersonation with intent to deceive law enforcement.

Brandt would not disclose what stolen property was discovered at the scene.
