The two new House members from the new District 19 are both Republican. The top two vote getters were Stace Nelson of Fulton and Kyle Schoenfish of Scotland with a respective 6,956 and 6,550 votes. The third candidate, Democrat Alan Fenner of Menno, finished with 3,708 votes.
Nelson currently serves in the Legislature but was moved into a new district when the legislative boundaries were redrawn. Schoenfish, who formerly ran as a Democrat, is headed to Pierre for office for the first time and will serve as one of the newest lawmakers.
Even before the polls opened Tuesday, the South Dakota Legislature was guaranteed a number of new faces from the southeast and south-central regions.
The following are the other area legislative races in South Dakota:

- District 16 (Union and Lincoln counties): The entire delegation will return to Pierre, as all three incumbents won re-election.
- In the State Senate race, Republican Dan Lederman, Dakota Dunes, defeated Democrat Michael O'Connor, Alcester, by a margin of 6,604-4,395, or about 60-40 percent.
- In the State House race, Republicans Jim Bolin of Canton and Patty Miller of North Sioux City won the two seats with a respective 6,760 and 5,093 votes. Rounding out the field were Democrats Ann Tornberg of Beresford with 4,969 and Stanley Jacobson of Hudson with 2,128.
- District 17 (Clay and Turner counties): The delegation will see two new faces.
In the State Senate race, Dem-

ocratic incumbent Tom Jones of Viborg retained his seat by defeating Republican challenger John Chicoine of Parker by a margin of 4,753-4,311.
It was a tale of two counties, as Jones won Clay County 3,175-1,746 and Chicoine won Turner County 2,565-1,578.
A new state senator was assured, as Republican Eldon Nygaard of Vermillion, previously a Democrat, did not run for re-election.
In the State House race, Republicans Nancy Rasmussen of Hurley and Ray Ring of Vermillion won the two seats with a respective 4,512 and 4,211 votes.
The third candidate, Democrat Marion Sorlien of Viborg, finished with 4,026 votes.
A new state representative was assured as Republican Jamie Boomgarden of Chancellor did not run for re-election.

- District 21 (Tripp, Gregory, Charles Mix and southwest Bon Homme counties): This newly re-districted area will see a new face.
In the State Senate race, Democrat Billie Sutton of Burke will return to Pierre as he defeated Republican John Meyer of Winner 5,722-3,901.
- In the State House race, Democrat Julie Bartling of Burke and Republican Lee Qualm of Platte will head to Pierre as they won the two seats with a respective 5,306 and 4,419 votes.
- The other two candidates were Republican Dave Scott of Geddes with 4,175 votes and Democrat Gary Coleman of Dante with 2,429 votes.
- Scott had been serving an appointment to the Legislature, as Gov. Dennis Daugaard chose him to fill a vacant seat.

South Dakota residents.
Varilek, 37, a former member of Democratic Sen. Tim Johnson's staff, countered that he better understood the middle class because he worked to put himself through college, earning several degrees. He also said he'd know how to get things done in Congress because of his experience with Johnson, particularly as the senator's economic development director since 2007.
One of Varilek's main claims was that Noem had shirked her duties in Congress by missing House Agriculture Committee meetings and skipping other committee and subcommittee

meetings. His catch phrase during the campaign became: "I'll show up."
Noem dismissed Varilek's attacks as "hogwash," saying she often had to miss Agriculture Committee hearings because she was in other committees or meeting with constituents. She said she hadn't "mastered the art of being in two or three places at the same time."
Varilek, of Sioux Falls, also criticized Noem for failing to get a House vote on a farm bill before Congress adjourned for the election. She said she'd done all she could.
Varilek was largely in a come-from-behind race from the start. Noem raised three times as much money for her campaign in a state where Republican voters far outnumber Democrats.

- South Dakota's U. S. Senate race hung in the balance today, but Republicans swept every other top state and congressional office in Tuesday's general election.

BOARD OF TRADE

CHICAGO (AP) — Grains futures rose Tuesday on the Chicago Board of Trade.
Wheat for December delivery rose 11 cents to \$8.77 a bushel; December corn rose 5.50 cents to \$7.41 a bushel; December oats rose 2 cents to \$3.60 a bushel; while January soybeans rose 12.25 cents to \$15.1550 a bushel.
Beef and pork futures were mixed on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange.
December live cattle rose 0.40 cent to \$1.2567 a pound; January feeder cattle fell 0.05 cent to \$1.4672 a pound; while December lean hogs rose 0.65 cent to 77.57 cents a pound.
