the front page of its Wednesday newspaper to clarify that it does not engage in such practices and that it was the *Lincoln Union County Times* that had published the mailer.

"One, we don't endorse candidates. Two, we're fair, and third, we thought this infringes upon copyright or brand," Odson said. "I assume they knew that they were creating that confusion when they were sending it out."

Odson also questioned whether the Union County Republican Party and its chairman, State Sen. Dan Lederman, believe in basic business principles.

anybody reads the paper, they'll see the title is completely different," he said. "It's a different name, it's free and it has a full disclaimer on it that it was paid for by the Union County Republicans."

Lederman added that he had no intention of deceiving readers and believes he did nothing wrong.

"The point wasn't to make it look like it," he said. "The point was to use a name that was synonymous with newspapers, which is Times. The name is different. It looks different. It has a different color for the name, and it has a different name altogether."

Odson said he does not plan to take any legal action against the Union County Republican Party, but had hoped for an apology.

According to Lederman, he will not receive one.

"I feel that the only apology should be to me, for insinuating that I was doing anything unethical," Lederman said.

In response, Odson said, "We have a basic disagreement, and the comments I've received from lots of people in Dakota Dunes and North Sioux City back our position."

South Dakota Newspaper Association general manager David Bordewyk could not be reached for comment.

dry weather was taking a toll on grasses and small grains" such as winter wheat, which as of Monday was running out moisture, David Miskus, a senior meteorologist with the Climate Prediction Center, wrote in authoring Thursday's report.

Thirty percent of Oklahoma's fledgling winter wheat crop was found to be in poor to very poor shape, a decline of 18 percentage points from the previous week, as topsoil moisture in the state continues to grow increasingly parched.

"With so much of Oklahoma already in (extreme or exceptional drought), it is getting difficult to degrade the state further," Miskus wrote.

Ninety-five percent of Nebraska and half of Iowa remained in the two worst drought categories, Thursday's update showed.

Conditions continued improving some states, such as Arkansas, where the amount of land in extreme or exceptional drought fell nearly 6 percentage points to 29.8 percent.

With the nation's harvest of corn and soybeans nearly completed, Midwest farmers have turned their attention to their winter wheat, with little cooperation from the weather as about two-thirds of those plantings have taken place in drought-affected areas.

Some 92 percent of the nation's winter wheat is now in the ground, on pace with the average planting speed over the previous five years, according to the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Seventy-three percent of the latest crop has emerged, consistent with the showing during the past half-decade.

Thirty-five percent of the U.S. winter wheat plantings are considered good while 42 percent are deemed fair. Nineteen percent of the crop is classified as poor or very poor.

Climate watchers haven't anticipated meaningful precipitation that would appreciably relax the grip of drought that has put soil moisture and levels of rivers and reservoirs used for irrigation at such a deficit.

Farmers embrace snowfall as a means of recharging soil moisture in time for each spring's corn and soybean sowings, with about 20 inches of snow equating to just an inch of actual water.
