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VERMILLION - If you watched offensive film on the Winner Warriors and Tri-Valley Mustangs without looking at the colors of the uniforms or the jersey numbers, you might think you were looking at two films on the same team.

Today (Friday) at the DakotaDome, though, the teams will get to see who does what they do better.

Similar offensive strategies and personel types will face off in the Class 11B final, a matchup of two programs with proud histories. Winner has won four titles, the last of which came in 2009 — against Tri-Valley in a game that was decided on a tipped-

play. The Mustangs have won three titles since 2007, including last year's 11B crown.

"Tri-Valley has been, without question, the most dominant team in Class 11B over the last six years. They have the athletes," said Winner head coach Dan Aaker. "They know what it takes to get there.'

The offensive similarities made for some unusual pre-championship feelings during preparations for the game.

It's been an easy-on-the-brain kind of week," said Tri-Valley head coach Steve Bazata. "It's been easy to prepare for plays. We've been working on getting kids mentally prepared for a physical battle."

VERMILLION — Just when the state got used to the Canistota Hawks pounding teams into submission with their bruising ground game, the Hawks pulled

out a new trick. They took to the air. Canistota set five Class 9A championship records — all involving the passing game — in a 52-8 rout of Warner in the South Dakota 9A championship football game on Thursday at the Dakota-

The victory capped a third consecutive undefeated season and a third straight title for the Hawks, who won the 9B title in 2010 and the 9A title last season. For senior quarterback/defensive back Cody Bunger, Joe Robbie MVP for a second straight year, the run is the culmination of years of chemistry.

"Our class has great cameraderie," he said. "This team has played together since third grade. We've learned each other's

strength and weaknesses. We were always hoping we'd get here, but it was not what we expected.

"It's all worked out for the best. I'm glad it did."

Bunger set a finals record with 294 passing yards, going 12-13 passing for three touchdowns. His 24 yards rushing gave him 318 yards total offense, also a 9A record.

"Cody throws a very catchable ball, and he doesn't try to force it in," said Canistota head coach Lenny Schroeder. "We run layered routes so he has plenty of targets. Our kids do a good

Bunger's top target, Nick Hofer, finished with seven catches for a 9A final record 195 yards, as well as two scores.

"Hofer's a good football player, the one nobody knew about," Schroeder said. "Everyone knew about our running game and our quarterback but,

Dolphins Hold Off Howard 25-22

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VERMILLION — The game clock was not kind to the Howard Tigers. And on the flip side, it favored the Deubrook Area Dolphins.

A 25-6 halftime lead appeared comfortable for the Dol-phins, but Howard roared back to make things interesting. Ultimately, the Tigers came up just short as Deubrook Area held on for a 25-22 victory in Thursday afternoon's

Class 9AA championship game in Vermillion.

The collective sigh of relief was no doubt audible across the DakotaDome, even if the players on the field

were trying not to look at the clock.
"We didn't have any doubts," said Deubrook Area senior tailback Ryan Knutson, who was named the Joe Robbie MVP after rushing for 262 yards. "We believe in each other and knew we could hang on together."

That's exactly what the Dolphins had to do after a dom-

Despite rolling up 395 yards of total offense, Deubrook Area (12-0) put together offensive series of a fumble, punt, turnover on downs, punt, punt and punt after halftime.

Howard, meanwhile, capitalized. Evan Donahue's 10-yard touchdown run at the 2:56 mark of the third quarter brought the Tigers within 25-14.

The next drive for the Tigers resulted in a turnover on downs, while their next series came up just short — by inches — on fourth down. They responded with an 11-yard touchdown pass from Landon Laible to Steve Larsen, followed by a conversion, to climb within 25-22 with two minutes to play.

'We never freaked out. We stayed calm and played our game of football," Deubrook Area head coach Adolph Shepardson said. "They don't let things like that get them done. They knew we just had to get some zeros and we'd

Howard's ensuing onside kick failed, and one short run play ran out the clock.

'This says that we have a lot of heart," Knutson said. 'We always stick together, we never get down on each other and we pick each other up."

Kuntson played a big role in his team building that early lead. He scored on a 62-yard touchdown run on his team's first drive, and, following an interception, needed just two plays to scamper 63 yards for another score. The

Knutson carried the ball 13 times for 244 yards in the first half, with those two long touchdowns. His big chunks of yardage — 18.8 yards a touch — forced Deubrook Area's defense to play 39 snaps in the first half.

"The biggest difference, and you could probably tell, we were on defense most of the first half," Shepardson said. "Our defense got really tired at the end, but we held on. The first half we played great football, probably as good as we've played all year. '

Still, the Tigers (9-3) — who came in as the eighth seed - held the Dolphins to 109 yards in the second half and kept them off the scoreboard.

Most importantly for Howard, it limited Knutson to 18 yards on 11 carries over the final two quarters to set the

stage for the big comeback. Wish we could have played the first half like we did the second half," Howard head coach Pat Ruml said. "This

hurts right now because we expected to win this game. "Deubrook played a great game. They're the state champions and they played like it."

VERMILLION — Following a successful 2011-2012 season that saw them go 23-8 (12-6 Summit League), the University of South Dakota Coyotes women's basketball team begins the 2012-2013 campaign a changed but still highly optimistic

The Coyotes, who open their season today at Cleveland State (12-19 last season), return only two starters from a year ago. Onida-native Alexis Yackley and Elk River, Minnesota's Tempestt Wilson, both seniors, will lead the charge from the guard position for this young USD team - nine of the 15 players on USD's roster are freshman or

sophomores. Yackley, who played her freshman year at Iowa State, started 30 of the Coyotes' 31 contests a year ago and led the Summit League in

assists per game (4.8). Wilson started all 31 games last season and finished third on the team in

scoring with 8.6 points per game. Other returning upper-classmen for the Coyotes include senior forward Pam January (appeared in 28 games last year) and senior guard Sam Mehr (23 games played in 2012-2013).

Junior Polly Harrington transfers to USD from Johnson Country Community College. The 5-11 Kansas City native, who played her freshman season at Louisville, averaged 11.1 points and 6.7 rebounds per game while shooting 50 percent

from the field for JCCC last year. Of all the new faces to join USD this season, perhaps the most excitement has come from the addition of head coach Amy Williams. Williams, a Spearfish native who played basketball at Nebraska, takes the reigns of the Coyotes after spending the past five years

at Rogers State University. Williams helped the Oklahoma school launch their basketball team and built the Hillcats into an NAIA contender. She spent the previous six seasons before that as assistant coach/recruiting coordinator at Oklahoma State (2001-2005) and Tulsa (2005-2007).

Williams noted that the energy level surrounding the Coyotes is high following a season that saw them make the second round of the

commented on media day. "That buzz has continued with our team," she added. "Since we've been able to get out on the court it's just been a fire - there's an ex-
