The corps' offices were closed Monday for Veterans Day, and messages seeking comment were not returned. That agency, the U.S. Coast Guard and other river interests have scheduled a news conference for Friday in St. Louis to discuss the current state and outlook for the Mississippi.

The corps said last week that the flow reduction to minimum winter levels is the first of several conservation measures necessary if drought conditions persist into 2013. The agency said precipitation levels remain below normal over the entire Missouri River basin.

Winter typically is a low-water period on the two big rivers, but the situation is more dire this year with many points along the waterways at or near historic lows. The Mississippi was at just over 9 feet in St. Louis on Monday, 16 feet below flood stage. It was at 1.5 feet at New Madrid in southeast Missouri, where flood stage is 34 feet.

The Missouri River was just over 5 feet in Hermann, Mo. (flood stage is 21 feet) and just under 5 feet at Leavenworth, Kan. (flood stage is 20 feet).

The low levels have been months in the making, fueled by the nation's worst drought in decades, which has turned soils bone dry throughout much of the Midwest. Any precipitation is quickly soaked up in the ground and doesn't make its way into the

Mississippi or other key rivers. "Some places have gotten a lot of rain, but those weren't huge runoff events to jack up the river," said Bob Holmes, a Missouri-based hydrologist for the U.S. Department of the Interior's U.S. Geological Survey.

To compensate, barge companies now are required to carry lighter loads, costing them more per ton to move cargo but also reducing chances of running aground as crews hustle to dredge silt and other sediments from the river to clear passages. One estimate put barge industry losses at \$1 billion the last time the Mississippi was this low, in 1988. But barge company executive P.B. Shaw said that conditions had improved by November of that year.

"Right now, that doesn't appear to be the case," said Shaw, president of Nashville, Tenn.-based Ingram Barge Co. After months of logistical headaches forced by the drought, "I'm kind of numb. That's a little exaggeration, but its' been a real tough year" showing no signs of easing, with climatologists broadly expecting the drought to carry into 2013.

Because of the drought, the Mississippi has received as much as 78 percent of its water from the Missouri this year, compared with 60 percent in a normal year, according to Nixon's office.

"I know that alternative measures are being considered to maintain the Mississippi channel, including dredging and clearing of rock pinnacles along the river," Nixon wrote. "I urge you to fasttrack and fully implement those efforts."

Extension: October Was Cool, But Dry Conditions Prevailed One positive note going forward

BROOKINGS — For only the second time in 2012, the statewide monthly average temperature was cooler than average in October. Statewide, nearly all locations were also drier than average, according to latest reports from the National Weather Service observers and the High Plains Regional Climate Center in Lincoln, Neb.

"There was very little drought relief to speak of," said Laura Edwards, SDSU Extension Climate Field Specialist.

"Harvest of corn, soybeans, and sunflowers is pretty much complete, which is a positive impact from drought, but winter wheat is continuing to struggle with the lack of moisture."

Only two climate observing locations were warmer than average in October, Hot Springs and Ardmore, both in Fall River county. Elsewhere, the mercury fell as much as five degrees below average. Wessington Springs, Forestburg, and Flandreau were among those that reported the largest differences from average.

A three-county area in the northeast was wetter than average, but that is an anomaly from the rest of South Dakota.
