2 Arrested In String Of Area Burglaries

Two Yankton minors were arrested Saturday on charges including grand theft, possession/receiving stolen property, third degree burglary and criminal entry of motor vehicles.

The arrests were made in a rash of vehicle burglaries, thefts and a house burglary in Yankton and Bon Homme counties.

According to the Yankton County Sheriff's Office, 14 vehicle burglaries occurred in the River-

side Acres area Friday and Saturday. Taken from the vehicles were assorted items including GPS units, tools, money and cigarettes.

On Saturday evening, Yankton County Sheriff's deputies responded to a report of a suspicious vehicle east of Yankton.

After investigation, a 17-year-old male and a 16-year-old male were arrested for the Riverside Acres vehicle burglaries. After further investigation, the two juveniles were found to be responsible for the burglary of a rural Gayville

residence that occurred in October.

Various stolen items were recovered that had been taken in the Yankton County thefts, as well as property stolen in Bon Homme County.

The investigation is continuing. Since many victims may have yet to discover the thefts from their vehicles, anyone who finds their vehicle to have been entered is encouraged to contact the Yankton County Sheriff's Office.

point, they even ran out of ammunition. By morning, emergency resupplies were dropped, helicopter gunships and Air Force gunships joined the fight and all was OK.

At one point, Moon looked over at the artilleryman at his side and asked if he thought their position had been compromised. The soldier agreed that might be possible, so Moon said, 'How about a cup of coffee?' They laid on their sides, took out heat tablets and made a cup of coffee.

At the recent company reunions, this recounting of a war memory draws great laughs, Moon said.

Only one man was wounded under Moon's leadership in that skirmish but lived, and intelligence reports indicated Company D inflicted heavy losses on the other side.

But remembering those tidbits of warfare are good for a soldier's soul, Moon said. The look on a guy's face or the way the rain was falling down help make the bad memories not so bad, so healing can begin.

"When I came home, I had lots of support groups; I was a profes-

sional soldier," said Moon. "But for most of the enlisted men, they had nothing."

"We were put out on the street and had nothing," Keiser agreed. "Readjustment was very difficult. It was not a popular war and the press berated us at every turn."

Moon pointed out that Americans didn't want to hear what they did or what was accomplished in Vietnam. All those soldiers went over there and came back home after they had learned to be men and take care of themselves, but America viewed it as a loss. He said the American public didn't understand the Vietnam soldiers did achieve what they set out to do.

"We went there to stop communism in its tracks and we did that," said Moon. "Today the Philippines, Thailand, all part of the Pacific Rim, Australia, are all still free countries. That's what we did; where we were successful."

Moon said he tried to impress the Crofton students the great opportunities they have today because soldiers have dedicated their lives — and even lost their lives — just to keep America safe and strong. Serving in the military is honorable and teaches responsibility, he said. He added that serving may put soldiers in situations they are not comfortable in, but many fathers, brothers and sons have responded the call anyway.

Because of Vietnam vets, Moon said, the U.S. government and the Veterans Administration today have changed the way they respond to American veterans. They now acknowledge the effects of Agent Orange and its role in certain types of cancers. They also recognize Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD) in post-war soldiers as a serious mental condition that needs professional help.

Almost ten years ago, Moon got a phone message that he wasn't sure he wanted to answer. It was a call for a company reunion and the former soldiers wanted him to attend. Driving the miles to the gathering brought several questions to Moon's mind. Did they want to throw rocks at him or burn him in effigy?

That first reunion was a coming-out party, said Moon. The soldiers had not seen each other since Vietnam in 1970 and it was a very emotional time for them. It was not just about reminiscing but about sharing feelings and concerns, things that had probably had been buried for 30 or more years. They were glad to share their past and their present.

Like their motto, Company D was still light, swift and accurate — a mean machine that had survived troubling times and moved into the future.
