Gertsema has served as the Yankton superintendent for 23 years. The new court date is scheduled for 9 a.m. Dec. 11 in Vermillion.

Social Security Office To Begin Reduced Hours

Effective Nov. 19, the Yankton Social Security office will be open to the public Monday through Friday from 9 a.m.-3 p.m., a reduction of 30 minutes each weekday. In addition, beginning Jan. 2, 2013, the of-

fice will close to the public at noon every Wednesday. While agency employees will continue to work their regular hours, this shorter public window will allow them to complete face-to-face interviews and process claims work without incurring the cost of overtime. The significantly reduced funding provided by Congress under the continuing resolution for the first six months of the fiscal year makes it impossible for the agency to provide the overtime needed to handle service to the public as it has done in the past.

In addition, on Nov. 23, the day after Thanksgiving, all Social Security field offices will be closed to the public. Employees working that day will focus on reducing backlogged workloads.

Most Social Security services do not require a visit to a local office. Many services, including applying for retirement, disability or Medicare benefits, signing up for direct deposit, replacing a Medicare card, obtaining a proof of income letter or informing officials of a change of address or telephone number are available at www.socialsecurity.gov or by dialing our toll-free number, 1-800-772-1213. People who are deaf or hard of hearing may call our TTY number, 1-800-325-0778. Many online services also are available in Spanish at www.segurosocial.gov.

State officials are conducting a study on how much they would cost. "Is it sick people? Is it mostly young people? Young adults are

cheaper to cover than 60-year-olds,' he said.

Daugaard said he doubts any Medicaid expansion will come by 2014, when much of the federal law goes into effect. But he said it might be possible in 2015 or 2016.

He said he hopes federal officials will allow flexibility on the income ceiling for eligibility, what ages to cover or what medical services would be included.

Under the new system, the federal government will cover the full cost of Medicaid expansions through 2016. The state's contribution would then begin to rise in stages to 10 per-
