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USD Set To Begin Boots' 25th Season

VERMILLION — Dave Boots made an apparent bold statement in guaranteeing his University of South Dakota men's basketball team will qualify for the 8-team Summit League tournament next March.

"I'll make that promise to you," the 25th-year head coach said at USD's media day, holding for comedic pause to later point out that the league only has nine teams and newcomer Nebraska-Omaha is ineligible.

"How we'll be in November is certainly not going to be how we're going to be in March.'

To that end, the Coyotes will cer-tainly be tested in their non-conference season, which begins today (Wednesday) at the 3-day Global Sports Showcase in Laramie, Wyo.

USD, which returns only four of its top 10 players from last season, will also face Gonzaga (Sunday), Iowa (Dec. 4) and Kansas State (Dec. 31).

'Those are the games you definitely look forward to, seeing how you can do on the national level," said Coyote junior guard Steve Tecker. "Hopefully it makes the Summit League seem easier."

The Coyotes, 10-18 a season ago, return only three players who saw significant minutes — juniors Trevor Gruis (C, 11.3 ppg, 6.7 rpg) and Tecker (G,

5.6 ppg, 3.7 rpg), as well as senior reserve Jordan Boots (G, 5.0 ppg).

In a move to bolster the team's depth and overall athleticism, USD brought in four transfers and three freshmen who figure to see quality minutes.

Of the newcomers, Karim Rowson (Jr., G, Western Oklahoma State) is likely to immediately start, while Adam Thoseby (So., G, Utah State) and Trey Norris (So., G, North Texas) will redshirt. Tyler Larson (Jr., G, Casper College) is out for the season after tearing his ÁCL.

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Game Means **Different Things** For USD, SDSU **BY JEREMY HOECK**

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The outcome of Saturday's resumption of the South Dakota State and University of South Dakota football rivalry will have a drastically different meaning for each side.

That part is yet to be deter-mined. What is certain, however, is how the Jackrabbits and Coyotes are approaching the game. SDSU, for example, has more far-reaching goals than simply beating its rivals to the south.

"We have a lot of stuff going on," SDSU coach John Stiegelmeier said in Tuesday's media teleconference. We have the rivalry that 98 percent of fans just want to see the game played, to be part of that history.

And then you have the playoff deal.'

That's right, the Jackrabbits (7-5-2), coming off a 20-17 loss at top-ranked North Dakota State, need one more win to crack the FCS post-season field.

We've chosen to focus on the two things that culminate," Stiegelmeier said. "The rivalry is not the only part of this deal. It's a chance to be in the playoffs and play some more football." The Coyotes (1-9, 0-7), on the

other hand, are embracing the game with full attention and haven't shied away from the magnitude.

A staff led by head coach Joe Glenn — himself a former Coyote player and assistant coach — is fully aware of the rivalry, Glenn said. Offensive coordinator Wes Beschorner and special teams coordinator Tim Triplett (son of former USD coach Dave) have also both experienced State-Ú games.

You just have to talk about it, and tell them about how they need to stay focused on the here and now," Glenn said. "Don't get caught up in anything but the game. You have to worry about the job at hand."

In an effort to further drive home the significance of such a game, the program plans to bring in alumni this week to talk to the players. That's not a new concept for the Coyotes, past coaches and players have attended practices, but this week naturally culminates a year-long goal.

"It's been a focus. One of our goals when we started the season is to win this game," Glenn said. This goes back a long way. It's what it is."

The football series between the two schools dates all the way back to 1889, with USD holding a 51-48-7 edge. SDSU, however, won eight of the final 10 meetings until the ri-

valry was put on hiatus after 2003. Since then, debates ranged from when the Coyotes and Jackrabbits would pla game would be played, and who would ultimately win. The alums are the ones that make the game; it's the talk of the state," Glenn said. "The rivalry will go on for everybody. The teams will have to go play, but they represent their students, their faculty and their fans. "It makes it a great game." Naturally, the 21st-ranked Jackrabbits are the obvious favorite at Coughlin-Alumni Stadium. SDSU ranks sixth in the Missouri Valley Football Conference in total offense, but sits third in rushing offense (169.3). That's the area USD has geared up to stop, Glenn said Tuesday. "Everybody's running on us, and we're doing our darnedest to stop the run. We're probably getting a little bit better at it," he said. "It just seems like every week someone has a great back and a good offensive line. The Jackrabbits are no different with sophomore running back Zach Zenner, who ranks second nation-

The Lancers, who improved to 3-2 with the win, made nine of 19 shots from behind three-point arc (47 percent), led by T.J. Johnson's three for six effort from long-range.

"It is nice to get back home and for the most part we looked pretty good," Lancer coach Jim Thorson said. "We accomplished what we needed to.

After an early 4-4 tie, Mount Marty used a trio of small 4-0 run throughout the first half to gain an edge over the Royals and never looked back. The Lancers closed the first period of play with a sixpoint scoring outburst for a 38-26 halftime lead and never let Grace back within 10 points.

"We can bring people in off the bench that can score," Thorson added. "As long as we keep mov-ing the ball and keep the pressure on the defense we will be alright."

Lennox-native, senior Austin Harms and sopho-more Saladin Smith led the Lancers with 14 points each, while Harms added a game-high eight rebounds.

Johnson, who scored nine of his 11 points via the three, and Joe Hieb (10 points) rounded out Mount Marty's double-digit scoring. The Lancers, who shot 57 percent from the

field, also made 18 of 28 three throws (64 percent) The one area that Thorson thought his team

could improve upon was rebounding, as Grace outrebounded the Lancers 36-34.
