Mount Marty's Dirksen, Illg Named HM All-GPAC

Two leaders on and off the court for the Mount Marty College volleyball program were honored by the Great Plains Athletic Conference on Wednesday, as senior outside hitter Amanda Dirksen and sophomore setter Caitlyn Illg were named honorable mention all-GPAC by a vote of the league's coaches.

Dirksen was the team leader in kills (240) and digs (262) this season, and ranked among the team leaders in service aces (20), and blocks (34, 3 solo/31 assisted). She also had 23 assists on the season.

The 5-8 outside hitter ranked 14 in the GPAC in digs and 18th in the conference in kills. She had 12 matches with double-digit kills, including twice recording a careerhigh 15 in a match. She also had 10 matches of double-digit digs this season, including a career-best 19
