Sedimentation Video Set For Welcome Center

The public is invited to learn more about sedimentation problems in the Missouri River reservoirs at a 2 p.m. presentation, Saturday, Nov. 17, at the Corps of Discovery Welcome Center south of Yankton. The Missouri Sedimentation Action Coalition (MSAC) developed a 15-minute video in response to questions surrounding what happened to sediment following the flooding of 2011. In November of 2011, MSAC captured several hundred aerial photos between Pierre and Sioux City. Long-time MSAC Executive Director Howard Paul, recently retired, narrated the video which blends aerial, historical and flooding photos. West River Water Development District and South Central Water Development District grants made the video project possible. MSAC distributes free copies of the video and has it posted in two parts on YouTube. Search for "MSAC sedimentation." "Everyone along the river is aware of the immense power the Missouri exhibited in 2011. Sediment was moved in many directions. Sediment certainly moved in the reservoirs, however, it did not move past the dam structures," said Sandy (Korkow) Stockholm, MSAC executive director. View an MSAC display at the Corps of Discovery Welcome Center through Nov. 17. Newsletters, fact sheets, and videos are available for the public. The welcome center is open 10 a.m. until 4 p.m., Monday through Saturday and noon until 4 p.m. on Sundays during its winter hours.

Wheat for December delivery fell 2.25 cents to \$8.4875 a bushel; December corn rose 2.25 cents to \$7.2575 a bushel; December oats rose 3.75 cents to \$3.6750 a bushel; while January soybeans rose 11 cents to \$14.19 a bushel. Beef and pork futures fell on the Chicago Mercantile Exchange. December live cattle fell 0.38 cent to \$1.2542 a pound; January feeder cattle fell 1.28 cent to \$1.4487 a pound; while December lean hogs fell 0.40 cent to 80.10 cents a pound.
