Arlington Beats Andes Central In Class B Day One Action

MITCHELL — Andes Central coach Rocky Brinkman turned away from the Corn Palace court.

With his Eagles trailing Arlington and struggling to slow down the Cardinals' multiple hitters in their quarterfinal match of the Class B state volleyball tournament on Thursday afternoon, Brinkman told team members on the bench in a quiet tone that "we can't get on the block."

What Brinkman said came at a time when Andes Central was having its toughest time stopping Arlington's hitters. The Cardinals had scored their last six points, including three straight, via kills, and were on their way to bouncing the Eagles to the consolation bracket.

Even though Andes Central recorded nine solo blocks and eight block assists, Arlington hitters Samantha Boeck, Brooke Hennrich and Jadyn Christensen led an offensive attack that recorded 54 kills, providing the punch that powered the fifth-seeded Cardinals to the semifinals with a 3-1 victory.

"They were hitting right through us," Brinkman said after the 19-25, 25-12, 25-22, 25-15 setback that puts the fourth-seeded Eagles (29-4) in today's noon consolation semifinal against No. 8 Lyman (16-13). "We weren't covering the line. Then we weren't getting far enough over, and then they were hitting right between us. Another thing, too, is they are a good ball club. They mix it up really well.

Arlington's first offensive priority was setting Boeck. The 5-foot-11 middle hitter who came into the tournament with a teamleading 580 kills recorded a match-high 23 kills Thursday. When setter Brett Heuer (51 assists and five kills) wasn't going to the Cardinals' top hitter, outside hitters Hennrich and Christensen did their part by adding 13 and eight kills, respectively.

'That was something that we wanted to be able to do was use the whole net," Arlington coach Anita Boeck said. "Our hitters did a nice job coming through."

While Arlington mixed up its attack, Brinkman said the Eagles needed to add more variety. Senior Kellie Winckler paced Andes Central with 13 kills while twin sister Krista Winckler had 11. Junior Dennisha Johanneson added four kills.

Andes Central played well in the first set. The Eagles answered each of the Cardinals' runs before scoring the final four points of the set (Kellie Winckler kills, Arlington hit error, Winckler block, Arlington lift) to win the set 25-19.

The Eagles came out sluggish in the second set, falling behind 10-3. After closing to within 12-8, thoughts of a comeback disappeared once the deficit grew to 20-10.
