Model Railroad Open House Nov. 23-24

On Friday and Saturday following the Thanksgiving holiday, trains will be running at 221 West Third Street, where the Missouri Valley Model Railroad Club will be held from 10 a.m.-4 p.m. both days. The location is in the lower level of the old J. C. Penney's Building on the southeast corner of Third and Cedar Streets.

The public is invited to come and re-live the excitement of railroading from the past up to today as it happened. Scale models will be displayed and operated during the open house.

The railroads offered dependable transportation over the years and still do today when highways and airports are closed by bad weather. In the spirit of the lyrics of the song, "I'll Be Home For Christmas," scenes on this HO gauge layout will remind visitors of railroad operation from the past up to the present. This will include trains from railroads serving Yankton such as The Milwaukee Road, Great Northern and Chicago and North Western from the past to the BNSF of today. From the 1940's trains of the Union Pacific, Burlington and Rock Island Railroads as well as the New York Central and other railroads around North America will be operated. There will also be models off trains operated by Amtrak as well as tourist trains in the mountains.

Scenes on the layout will include fire stations, illluminated buildings and a lighthouse. Beside the buildings there are street lights, and operating traffic signals. Scenery includes mountains, rivers, rail yards, bridges, a military installation, and operating turntables. There will be an N gauge layout on display in addition to the HO gauge layouts.

shown recovery or weren't hit as hard. And some economists believe any drought-related price increases might be seen next year.

"Generally, food costs are continuing to rise due to many factors beyond the drought and fuel costs," said Marjorie Zastrow, a nutrition field specialist with the C operative Extension Service at South Dakota State University (SDSU)

The estimates for increases in the cost of a Thanksgiving Day din-ner range from 1-13 percent, Zas-

trow said.

"The primary increases in costs are the for turkey and products grown or produced with grains,"

"The varying in the pershe said. "The varying in the percent of increase is dependent on factors which economists take into account when working their calculations.

Even with the price hike, the turkey should remain an affordable centerpiece of the Thanksgiving

meal, Zastrow said.
"Though the cost of turkey has increased, it is still one of the lower cost traditional dishes," she said. "The cost of turkey may in-

crease slightly this year with the increased cost of input factors for production.

The increased cost of the Thanksgiving Day dinner is also influenced by the purchase of more pre-packaged foods, Zastrow said. The convenience foods, whether purchased from a deli or package, include the product's cost for labor, packaging and distribution,

she said.
"In general, there is a trend toward the purchase of convenience foods with people's hectic lifestyles," she said. "Generally, convenience foods do have an increased cost as compared to those prepared from scratch at home.

Nutrition may also play a role in deciding to prepare the meal with fewer convenience foods, Zastrow

said.
"Foods prepared from scratch at home also tend to have fewer calories from fat and sugars and a lower content of sodium," she said.

This year's projected 1 percent increase for the Thanksgiving meal continues a trend of higher food costs, but less than in past years, according to the AFBF study.

The yearly average for the Thanksgiving meal ran at \$28.74 in 1986, according to the AFBF. The average price broke the \$30 mark in 1996, rising to \$31.66. Ten years later, in 2006, the price stood at

In 2007, the meal's cost broke

the \$40 mark. The meal took a nearly \$6 hike from \$43.47 in 2010 to \$49.20 in 2011. This year's forecast cost is \$49.48

Thanksgiving Dinner is a special meal that people look forward to all year," said John Anderson, AFBF's deputy chief economist. Most Americans will pay about the same as last year at the grocery store for a turkey and all the trimmings

Savvy shoppers may pay even less for frozen tom turkey compared to AFBF's 155 volunteer shoppers who checked prices at grocery stores in 35 states.

in special sales and promotions close to Thanksgiving," Anderson explained. "Anyone with the patience to wait until the last minute to buy a turkey for Thanksgiving could be rewarded with an exceptional bargain," he said.

In addition to the turkey, a combined group of miscellaneous items, including coffee and ingredients necessary to prepare the meal (onions, eggs, sugar, flour, evaporated milk and butter) increased in price, to \$3.18. A dozen brown-nserve rolls also increased slightly

this year, up 3 cents to \$2.33. Items that showed a price decrease from last year were: a half pint of whipping cream, \$1.83, down 13 cents; a 14-ounce package of cubed bread stuffing, \$2.77, down 11 cents; three pounds of

sweet potatoes, \$3.15, down 11 cents; one gallon of whole milk, \$3.59, down 7 cents; fresh cranberries, \$2.45, down 3 cents; one pound of green peas, \$1.66, down 2 cents; a 30-ounce can of pumpkin pie mix and two nine-inch pie shells, \$5.53, down 2 cents.

A one-pound relish tray of carrots and celery remained the same at 76 cents. Anderson noted that despite retail price increases during the last year or so, American consumers have enjoyed relatively stable food costs over the years, particularly when adjusted for inflation.

The slight percentage increase in the national average cost reported this year by Farm Bureau for a classic Thanksgiving dinner tracks closely with the organization's 2012 quarterly market basket surveys and the government's Consumer Price Index for food. Even with the price increases, the Thanksgiving Day meal sym-

bolizes the bountiful food supply and relatively low cost of meals, Graff said.
"We are still talking about gath-

ering our families on this particular day and giving thanks for the things we are so incredibly blessed to have," she said.
