WATERTOWN — Only one team in the state of South Dakota had handed Dakota Valley a setback in the 2012 season.

Unfortunately for the Panthers, who were playing in their first-ever state volleyball championship match, it was the team on the opposite side of the net.

Sioux Falls Christian completed a season sweep of the Big Sioux Conference rival Panthers with a 25-22, 25-16, 25-15 victory in the title match of the South Dakota State Class A Volleyball Tournament on Saturday at the Watertown Civic Arena.

The title was the third straight and fourth in six years for the Chargers under head coach Darci Wassenaar.

The Chargers had won both of the previous meetings with Dakota Valley in 3-0 sweeps, but the Panthers' play in Watertown had Christian taking notice.

"We've seen them a couple of times, but they were playing so well this week," Wassenaar said. "We had

to at least slow down their hitting." The Chargers did just that, holding Dakota Valley to 19 kills in the match. Besides getting six blocks including two solo and three assisted stops from Stacy Smidt — Christian used 13 ace serves to slow down the Panthers. Kristin Stern had eight of those aces, with Kiara Vander Pol recording three.

Stern had a team-best 10 kills, with Smidt recording nine and Vander Pol eight. Hayley McCarron distributed the ball for 28 assists. Miranda Velgersdyk added eight digs in the win.

McCarron, Stern and Vander Pol were named to the all-tournament team.

After a sluggish start, Gonzaga's starters rotated back into the game just past the midway point of the first half and ripped off an 18-4 run as the lead reached 20.

The run included a tip-in by Harris, who had 12 points and 13 rebounds to spark the Bulldogs to a 46-30 lead.

The Coyotes shot 38 percent in the first half but struggled early.

Gonzaga dominated the opening minutes of the second half and quickly pushed the lead to 27.

BROOKINGS — After nine years, t took all of 12 and a half minutes for the more experienced, playoffbound team to take control.

Never mind that it was a rivalry game, early struggles again led to another loss for the University of South Dakota football team.

Thanks to three first-quarter touchdowns and a suffocating run defense, South Dakota State escaped late drama to beat the Coyotes 31-8 on Saturday in front of 15,278 fans at Coughlin-Alumni Stadium.

The biggest story, aside from the anticipation? A 21-0 cushion for the Jackrabbits within 12 minutes and 44 seconds of game action.

"It's a little bit the story of our season, the way the game started out," said USD coach Joe Glenn, whose team finished the season 1-10. "Like boom, boom boom we got hit with three really good shots.

"We couldn't get anything going, and it was 21-0 before we got rolling.'

Before the dust had settled, the Jackrabbits (8-3) had taken the opening drive 75 yards for a touchdown, returned a Coyote fumble 43 yards for a score and capped off another drive with a touchdown run at the 2:16 mark of the first quarter The damage was done. The hole

was dug.

'It was a shot to the gut right away," USD sophomore quarterback Josh Vander Maten said. "We made too many mistakes right away and it was hard to overcome.

It took the air out of us, and we never got on track after that."

Another kind of air also caused problems early for USD, specifically on its first play from scrimmage. A go-route by senior receiver Will Powell had him open by five steps, but the pass from Vander Maten sailed long. A would-be touchdown — and potential game-changer — was the first in a series of golden opportuni-

Jayde Bergmann had seven kills to lead Dakota Valley. Kylie Martin had five kills, with Morganne Pfaffle posting four kills and Lindsey Smith adding 15 assists for the Panther offense. Shyler Funck had 13 of the team's 31 digs.

Smith, Bergmann and Funck were all named to the all-tournament team.

Both teams started off on edge, as the teams combined for four consecutive service errors and six service errors in the first nine serves.

"I think everyone was a little tight, had a little extra intensity," Wassenaar said. "I thought we settled down after that. We served tough and kept in the court.'

Neither team scored more than three consecutive points until the Chargers broke a 20-20 tie with four straight points. The Panthers got two of those back but could not rally in the frame.

"I knew there was not going to be a lot of big runs," said Dakota Valley head coach Don Craig. "I just told them to keep the ball in play. They just kept pushing.

Dakota Valley led 4-2 in the opening set before the Chargers took control. Again, Sioux Falls Christian could not score more than four straight points, but kept the Panthers from stringing more than two points in a row together as they turned the early deficit into a 19-11 advantage.

Stern helped the Chargers put the match out of reach in the third set, serving two aces and keeping the Panthers out of rotation as Christian ran off eight straight points.

Sioux Falls Christian finished with a 30-4 record.

MITCHELL - With her players gathered around her in a tight huddle, Parker vollevball coach Jill Christensen talked to her team in a quiet tone.

# Wagner Escapes Roncalli 3-2 For Consolation Championship In 'A'

WATERTOWN — After playing for a championship a year ago and faltering in the opening round of the South Dakota State Class A Volleyball Tournament this year, the Wagner Red Raiders were not going to let anything stand in their way of a strong finish and a consolation championship.

Not even an Aberdeen Roncalli squad that just would not go away.

Wagner survived late-set surges by the Cavaliers to claim a 24-26, 25-18, 30-28, 19-25, 15-11 victory in the fifth place match of the state tourney, held Saturday at the Watertown Civic Arena.

The victory sent Wagner home with a 30-4 record. Roncalli ended the season at 24-7

Wagner saw a 24-20 lead evaporate in the opening set, taken by Roncalli. The Cavaliers closed a 10-point deficit to 24-18 before dropping the second set. In the third set, Roncalli trailed 23-20 before forcing five extra points.

Allie Lundquist had 29 assists, with Kate Heintzman recording 18. Libero Taylor Hanson had 40 digs, with Hailey Kline posting 24 and Alyssa Wherry adding 13 of the team's 107 digs.

Doom and Dockter were each named to the all-tournament team.

Roncalli had early success by working around the Wagner net defense. The tide began to turn in the Red Raiders' favor when those tips stopped hitting the floor.

"They started picking up our tips," said Ron-

calli head coach Janelle Bierle. "There were a lot of deflections that could have gone either way. These teams were so closely matched that it could have gone either way."

Losses in sets one and four could have tipped the match in Roncalli's favor, but the Red Raiders were determined not to let a second consecutive season end with a loss.

Coach Tyler told us to play as hard as we could," Doom said. "We didn't want it all to go to waste.

The victory concluded the career for three Wagner seniors — Breen, Doom and Weber — who helped the team make the state tournament for a fifth straight season and sixth time in seven years.

"I am so proud of our team," Breen said. "I couldn't ask to be a part of a better team. I'm proud of how this team came together.'

While the team had its lowest state tournament finish since 2006, Wagner still won two matches at state for the sixth straight tournament appearance.

"I wish we could have ended better, but I'm still glad we finished fifth," Weber said. "We had a really great season."
