knowledged as much, saying "If we get out and recruit, and we keep working, we'll get this train rolling in Vermillion, I promise you."

Far from simply one recruiting class, USD won't drastically improve with one group of players, but it can certainly try. Once the program identifies a style, it has to then go out and recruit to that system. With the idea of wanting a fresh start in 2013, it wouldn't surprise me if the coaching staff assesses every area as "open" for next year.

Offensive line? Might be the time to bring in some kids to push the four starters coming back.

Quarterbacks? This appears to be a position solidified by Vander Maten, who has two full years left. Back-up Kevin Earl had a solid debut at Indiana State, but threw two interceptions late at SDSU

Defensive line? Might be the time to recruit bigger kids. USD was consistently undersized

Linebackers? USD will graduate starters Tim Marlette and Darius Hogans, leaving some holes to fill. Tyler Starr will return, but will the coaches move him back to the line?

Secondary? That was the one area hit hardest by outside issues. Chris Frierson and Chris Lundy were both kicked off the team, leaving freshmen and newcomers to handle the duties.

Special teams? A source of consistent frustration for USD. First was a problem with blocked punts, but by the time coaches got that straightened out, field goals became an issue.

On the other hand, inexperience was a rather common theme for the Coyotes in 2012. There were simply too many areas with new starters for the team to put together a winning season; too many holes to fill from a senior class of 23 in 2011. When you added to the mix new leadership from the coaching staff, the turnover was going to be drastic.

the Coyotes, from offensive to defense and to special teams, every area struggled.

The good news about a 1-win season? You can only go up, as Vander Maten pointed out after Saturday's game. Fordham, another FCS program, turned around last year's 1-10 record with a 6-5 record this season, while Villanova jumped from 2-9 last season to 8-3 this fall. So, yes, it can be done.

'We just have to keep improving," Vander Maten said. "We're going to take this into the off-season and not forget about it, and use any fuel we got from this season and just try to be a better team each day."

Will it happen in 2013? All signs would point to yes, given that Glenn and his staff will have a full recruiting cycle this winter. That will be the key to any kind of improvement.
