

It's Clara Wintermute's 12th birthday. As part of a well-off family in London in 1860, naturally she'll get lots of presents, including the one she's begged for the most. Ever since she saw the traveling puppet show put on by Grisini and his two orphan assistants, she's begged her father to allow them to put on a show at her party. Even though Grisini is a 'dirty foreigner' her father gives in. Then Clara begs her nanny to allow her to invite the two orphans, Lizzie Rose and Parsefall, to have tea with her. She finds the children fascinatingthey're actually making their own way in the world!

The puppet show ends on a ghostly note, which strikes a painful chord with the Wintermute family. All four of Clara's brothers and sisters died seven years ago of cholera and her family is still in mourning. Clara's laughter at the morbid show is disgraceful to her parents; her mother says she can never forgive Clara. Before he leaves, Grisini shows Clara a watch that mesmerizes her. That very night Clara disappears.

Grisini is the prime suspect but Lizzie Rose



and Parsefall know she's nowhere in the boarding house they all live in. Grisini's new puppet that they find unnerves them, thoughshe's the spitting image of Clara.

Meanwhile, many miles away an old witch lies dying. She clutches her precious fire opal to her chest but it only brings her pain. Even though it's brought her tremendous power throughout her life, it's also made her miserable. And legend has it that all its previous owners have died in flames. Cassandra sees their anguished faces in the mirrors around her. She's desperate to avoid that fate. Only one person knows how she can rid herself of the opal's curse-Grisini. She mentally sum-

Left alone, Lizzie Rose and Parsefall try to scrape by. Then Lizzie finds a letter addressed to Grisini, written by an old lady many miles away. The old lady is asking him to come and bring his assistants; she is old with no heirs and wishes to leave her fortune to them. It seems fishy, but with the cops looking for them they have no choice but to flee, and the old lady's place is the only option they have.
They have no idea that it's a trap set for them
by Grisini and the old lady.

This book provides plenty of suspense and surprises. It's for ages 9 and up but adults will find enough substance in it to satisfy them, too. It will remind you to be careful of what you ask for as birthday gifts!
